## ANOTHER PIONEER CONE.

Mrs. Elizabeth Douglass, Who Came to Uta in 1852 - Mother of 16 Children

Ferdinand Engelke Will Appeal to Supreme Court-Middleton-Hill Wedding-News Briefs.

Mrs. Elizabeth Douglass, a ploneer and highly esteemed lady of this city. departed this life at the family residence Monday night as the result of neuralgia of the heart. The funeral services over her remains will be held at the Second ward meetinghouse Thursday at 2 p. m.

Mrs. Douglass was born Aug. 10, 1833 in Manchester, England. She came to America in 1846 on the ship Liverpool, and made her home in St. Louis for a short time, where she met Richard Douglass, to whom she was married June 21, 1849. She became a membe of the Church of Jessu Christ of Latter day Saints and came to Sait Lake City in 1853, where she resided for a short time and then came to Ogden which has since been her home almost eve since. Mrs. Douglass passed through almost all the trials and hardships of the early pioneers, and helped to make this state what it is. She was the mother of 16 children, 11 of whom survive her, as well as numerous grand and great-grandchildren.
