LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRE.—The bill at the Theatre for to-morrow night should attract a large audience. The stirring drama of "Richard Darvil" will be the first piece played, and the performance will wind off with the farce of the "Married Rake." The drama abounds in scenes of exciting interest, and the chief characters will be played by esteemed favorites of the public, supported by the full strength of the company. The farce is sufficiently laughable to affect the risibilities of the most stolidly inclined.

THE RAID ON PROVO.—Our readers and the public generally will be astounded at the account, in this afternoon's News, of the raid on Provo last night, by a party of U. S. troops. We have every reason to believe that quite a number here would not be sorry to see the mobbing scenes of former times repeated, but we think that there are but very few indeed, except the members of the anti-Mormon "ring" who will not regret and be surprised at this affair. Dr. Ormsby Jr., at the time, proposed to amputate the foot, but at the solicitation of the many friends of Brother Mathias the foot was spared, as it was believed that amputation could be avoided. Dr. Ormsby, under whose care the patient has been ever since the accident, sent for Dr. Anderson, of Salt Lake City, and these two medical men concluded it would be necessary to amputate the leg a little above the knee. The operation was successfully performed on Tuesday the 20th inst. The patient is progressing favorably.

AID FOR THE WOUNDED.—The War Sanitary Committee, of Nevada, recently forwarded to Germany, for the benefit of the wounded soldiers, a valuable "brick."
