Not one was aided by a foreign government or by contri-butions from Utah. The Danes and Swedes possessed but little money, but the Swiss emigrants had between them over \$5,000, and a number of the Germans held drafts for a few hundred dollars. Their railroad passage to Utah, which had been prepaid, amounted to \$14,779.90.

If those cases appear to come within the law, I shall certainly exercise the right of requiring the steamship company which brings them here to take them back at once."
