TELEPHONE FIGHT IS ENDED

Poisoning.

Both Phones Will be Used by Medicos -Dentist Graduates-The Fourth In Ogden Valley.

Ogden, June 30 .- Col. George Hanson, Cprivate secretary for U. S. Senator George Sutherlond, is lying dangerousiv ill at the Ogden General Hospital. and grave fears are entertained for his recovery. He is suffering from uremic poisoning and was unconscious from 2 o'clock in the afternoon until about 1 o'clock this morning, a twhich time he regained consciousness and then dropped into a natural sleep.

dropped into a natural sleep. Yesterday morning at the office of the county treasurer where he was doing some clerical work, Mr. Hanson com-plained to F. J. Hendershot, Jr., with whom he was working, that he was not feeling well and said that he thought he would go home and rest for a while. About an hour before noon he left the office and went to his room at the Pomeroy residence at 435 Twen-ty-eighth street. When he arrived at the house there was no one home and Col. Hanson went immediately to his room.

A little while later one of the neigh-ors reported to the police department nat a man in the Pomeroy house was that a man in the Pomeroy house was shricking as if in great agony. County Physician and City Physician Browning were advised and hurred to the scene where they found the sufferer and hur-riel him to the Ogden General hospital where Drs. Conray and Joyce were called in and after several hours labor-ing over the patient he slowly regained consciousness.
