

News Items More Than Forty Years Old.

Confusion Over Dual Names for Postoffices and Towns—Stopping the Sale of Government Mules—Eastern Mail, Military Maneuvers and Cheap News-papers—One of Utah's First Fairs.

(From Files of Deseret News, October, 1869.)

Changing Names.—A postmaster of a small village in this territory that like many others has the misfortune to be called by three or four names, wrote us to correct certain errors. It is certainly a great inconvenience to have a place called by one name and its postoffice by another. The continual changing of the name of a village or settlement is superlative nonsense, as all will testify who know how much inconvenience is occasioned by such mutations.

The Mule Sale.—After selling some 60 or 80 of the government mules at Camp Floyd, on the 26th inst., as per advertisement, counter orders were received from the quarter department, whereupon the sale ceased, and instead of any more government mules they wish to purchase, buy as many as they have sold. It is thought that at least one of the regiments at Camp Floyd is ordered to Colorado to take part in the Mojave war.

A Nuisance.—If the pole bridge at the intersection of Second West and North Temple streets is not a public nuisance we should like to know what it takes

to constitute one in this city. Every person who has occasion to cross it with a team is in danger of being deprived of his property without process of law, and all who cross it more than once are twice put in jeopardy of life and limb.

By Eastern Mail.—The eastern mail arrived yesterday morning about 9 o'clock, by which we received Boston papers of the 2nd, New York to the 3rd, and St. Louis to the 6th, of September. The latest dates from Europe are 20th of August.

The military fete which took place at

Paris on the entry of Napoleon on the 14th day of August is said to have been a very brilliant affair; the troops were headed by the emperor and the display made was very imposing.

By the California Mail.—With usual

punctuality the California mail arrived on Thursday, the 13th inst., bringing Sacramento and other papers to the 24th ult.

The most exciting topic of the day on the Pacific side of the continent was the death of Senator Broderick, who died on the 16th of September from a wound received in a duel with Judge Terry. The body was interred in the Lone Mountain cemetery, the Catholics objecting to its being interred in the mission, because he had been killed in a duel.

Our streets during the past two or three days have presented an unusually thriving appearance, chiefly owing to the large number of people from the settlements, north, south and west, who have come to attend the State Agricultural exhibition, and to be present at the semi-annual conference. Peradventure some have come to participate with us in the opportunities of purchasing cheap goods "at cost and 15 cents freight," i.e., to buy sugar at 40 cents per pound; coffee at 45 cents, tea at \$2.50, sheeting at 25 cents per yard, calicoes at 20 and 30 cents, stoves at \$75

and \$150, and so forth. We wish you success, good friends, but pray, do keep your eyes open, lest at any time you should be surprised by land sharks and swallowed whole.

City Prison.—After having suffered much inconvenience for the want of a suitable place for the confinement of whisky drinkers and other "high-toned" gentlemen, who have been exceedingly numerous in Great Salt Lake City since the introduction of the popular pastimes and customs of the day, the city authorities have at last erected a comfortable stone prison for the accommodation of such as have to be provided with lodgings. On visiting the prison a few days since we saw a respectable gentleman in the occupancy of one of the rooms, in a state of intoxication. A sad contrast with his situation in life heretofore.

A Rumor.—It has been recently reported during the past two days that the California mail, which left here last Wednesday (Oct. 5) was attacked some two or three days out from Camp Floyd, and several men killed.

Pistol Shooting.—The practice of shooting off pistols in the night time has been so common for a long time in this city that a very little notice has been taken of such occurrences. Not infrequently from 10 to 20 shots are heard in rapid succession, as if some deadly conflict was taking place, much to the annoyance of peaceful citizens.
