LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

President's Message.—We surrender our editorial columns this evening to give space for the President's Message, which we publish in full.

Beef.—Brother Isaac Brookbank returned yesterday from a trip to Sevier County, bringing with him 125 head of cattle, in good condition. They are for beef for the Church here.

He left for Cache to-day, on similar business.

Dust.—People coming in from the south say, the dust on the roads in that direction is so superabundant as to be absolutely intolerable to travelers. Let a wailing shower descend and the same parties would assert that the miniature oceans of mud were disgustingly insubstantial.

Utah Northern.—At a meeting of the directors of the Utah & Northern Railroad, held at Logan, last Wednesday, officers were elected as follows: President, Roy M. Bassett; Vice President, Wm. B. Preston; Secretary, Moses Thatcher; Treasurer, Robert S. Campbell; Superintendent, George W. Thatcher.

Committed.—Two young men, named Knobs and Giller, were in the police court this morning, charged with breaking into a house and stealing several articles. The party first named was held in \$300 and the second in \$200 bonds, to answer to the grand jury. In default of finding bail they were committed to the county jail.

Re-Organization.—The Seventh Ward Young Men's Mutual Improvement Association re-organized last evening, by the following election: President, David McKenzie; First Counselor, George C. Lambert; Second Counselor, Charles H. Evans; Secretary, John E. Callister; Assistant Secretary, Herbert Thurston.

Z. C. M. I.—A meeting of the Directors of Z. C. M. I., was held to-day. The old board retired and the new, having previously qualified, entered upon their duties. The new board are as follows:—

President, W. H. Hooper; Vice President, Wm. Jennings. **John Taylor, H. S. Eldridge, W. Woodruff, Geo. Q. Cannon, Brigham Young, Moses Thatcher and John Sharp, Directors.**

Expensive Music.—John Nash, of Logan, was arrested yesterday, at Kasville, by Constable Bennett, of that place, on a charge of stealing a violin from Myron B. Randall, at the Point of the Mountain City. He was brought to the City last evening and had a preliminary examination before Justice Fyffe this morning, resulting in his being committed, in default of finding \$200 bonds, to await the action of the grand jury in his case.

That Entertainment.—The entertainment for the benefit of the 25th Ward Sunday School will commence at half-past seven this evening, doors open half an hour before. It promises to be an excellent affair, and will consist of songs, recitations, dialogues, choruses, duets, etc., by the teachers, scholars and others. Brother John Daynes will be musical director and Prof. Jas. J. Daynes accompanies.

Emigration.—Rabbit Valley, Potlato Valley and Grass Valley, east of the valley of the Sevier, are being gradually settled up by a continuous stream of emigration from the more northern and thickly populated portions of the Territory.

This emigration appears to be going on, while the bulk of the people of this more northern part are scarcely aware of it.

The valleys named are said to be blessed with productive soil and other excellent facilities.

District Court.—Tuesday, October 16th. **Salt Lake City, vs. M. Edwards;** dismissed.

John S. Barnes, et al., vs. C. F. Smith, et al.; the jury, disagreed, and were discharged.

James McKnight, vs. Samuel Turnbow; continued for the term.

The People, et al., vs. Thomas B. Heller, Joseph Garner, et al.; the jury having returned a verdict of guilty, the prisoners, Heller and Garner, were sentenced each to imprisonment, in the penitentiary, at hard labor, for seven years.

The People, et al., vs. Curtis B. Hawley; two cases of larceny; the jury returned a verdict of not guilty, in each case, and the prisoners were discharged.

Potatoes.—This morning Brother Thomas E. Jeremy, of the 16th Ward, who is noted as a raiser of excellent vegetables, exhibited to some very fine specimens of potatoes, two kinds of which, so far as we are aware, are new to Utah.

They are "Butter's Redskin Flour" and "Hemp's Beauty." Both are late, are quite large, very prolific, and of most excellent quality.

There were also specimens of the Extra "Early Vermont," said to be a little earlier than the "Early Rose."

Utah is not surpassed in the matter of potatoes by any spot on the globe; and yet, by the introduction of new and excellent varieties, like the first two named, the root can still be improved. Nearly every kind flourish in this section and all climates.

Man Killed—Land, Slides.—The following was received by telegraph:

BIRMINGHAM, Oct. 16.

A man, named P. Harrington, was killed in the Brown Mine, this a.m., by ore coming on him.

Thomas Brown was crushed and knocked into the road by a land slide striking it, at 1 p.m. No one was hurt.

Sentenced.—It will be seen by the minutes of the District Court that the notorious Thomas B. Heller and one of his partners in crime have been sentenced to imprisonment for seven years, in the penitentiary. Heller may not exactly be where he "can do the most good," but is probably now where he can do the least harm. The people of northern Utah will probably be able to sleep sounder now that some of the leading monsters of a thieving gang have been placed in safe keeping. If some of the "silent partners" in the cattle-stealing firm of Heller & Co., were in a position to keep him company in his new quarters, the ends of justice would probably be still better subserved.

Railroad Business.—On Thursday last, the civil engineers for the Utah Northern extension went to Logan, where they were joined by Hon. Moses Thatcher, and the party set out for Franklin, at which point that gentleman and a portion of the surveying party proceeded north via the Sida Springs or Gentile Valley route to the proposed temporary terminus. The intention was to return by the western or Marsh Valley road, their trip describing a perfect loop from Franklin and back; and a section of one or the other of these routes will be made for the extension.—Ogden Junction.

Ogden Canon.—Huntsville and Eden.

Editors Deseret News:

Grim winter appears to be approaching us in this part of the country. A change has recently taken place in the weather, from warm to cold, rendering an overcoat a very agreeable article of apparel to don, at the present time. Several cold storms with which we have been lately visited have converted the late dust heaps into a muddy slush, and the ground is covered with snow, and heavy, threatening storm clouds.

Yesterday I took a trip, in company with Mr. W. G. Child, through Ogden canon, to Huntsville. Although vegetation is now in the autumn and yellow leaves are falling, the scenery is still the scenery along the whole route is delightful to gaze upon.
