

Indianapolis, Ind., May 9.—The so-called "drug trust" was perpetually en-joined today from continuing its oper-ations by the decree in the United States court in the district of Indiana, apon complaint of the United States government, filed by Joseph B. Keat-ing, United States district attorney. The defendants, 92 in number, who are the members, officers, directors, agents and attorneys of the National Association of Retail Druggists' associa-tion, Tri-Partite proprietors, "Black List Manufacturers." direct contract proprietors, wholesale Druggists' associa-tion, tri-Partite proprietors, "Black proprietors, wholesale contract pro-prietors, and Charles C. Baumbaugh, are perpetually enjoined from combin-ing and conspiring to restrain the sale of drugs, fix prices by agreement, black list retailers who cut prices or to refuse to sell any retailer on equal terms. All publication of black lists is porbiden and all contracts and agree-ments covered by the charges are de-ared vold. The direct contract serial number for so the adontion of schedules for the

Baumbaugh was charged in the bill of complaint with being en-gaged in printing and chroulating lists called black lists, which contained the mames of druggists throughout the country who sold proprietary articles and medicines at prices less than those which the alleged combination ordered. As charged, he would Send a list each month to every retail and wholesale druggist in the United States, who be-longed to the association of those ac-eused of cutting prices, and as a re-sult of this, these "aggressive cutters," as they were called, could not buy goods.

It was further charged that those ac-cused of cutting prices on proprietary medicines were unable to purchase any kind of drugs from the members of the several associations. All such practises are perpetually enjoined. The decree entered today was dic-tated by the government attorneys and agreed to by the defendants. With the entering of the decree the litigation came to an end with a complete victory for the government. TEXT OF THE DECREE.

TEXT OF THE DECREE. The decree entered in the United States circuit court in the so-called "drug trust" case provides that the defendants and each and all of them, their directors, committees, agents, em-ployes, servants and all persons, acting under or through them or in their be-half, or claiming so to act, or affiliated or associated with them, are perpetual-by enjoined, restrained and prohibited from doing any act, in pursuance of or for the purpose of carrying out the combination, conspiracy and agreement in restraint of trade and commerce and from monopolizing said trade and com-merce, as alleged in the bill of com-plaint.

hat the National Association of Retail Druggists and all members, etc., of the association, are perpetually en-joined from, by promises, threats, ridi-cule or determination, inducing, forcing or compelling any manufacturer of proprietary articles and medicines, drugs, pharmaccutical preparations, survival cumplies physics or demonstrations. drugs, pharmaceutical preparations, surgical supplies, plasters or druggists' sundries, to enter into any contract, agreement or understanding in further-

ance of the combination and conspir-acy, as alleged in the bill, regarding or relating to the articles and commo-dilles of his profession, or inducing, fercing or compelling any such manu-facturer to adopt any plan for market-ing the article of his or its manufac-ture in furtherance of combination and conspiracy, as alleged in the bill, from issuing, causing to be issued, or ald-ing in any way in the publication of lists or other documents purporting to contain the names of persons, corpora-tions or partnerships adhering to their contracts or maintaining or refusing of the combination or maintaining on efusing to maintain prices, and in furtherance | any market.

Chicago, May 10 .- The Record Her ald today says: American railways will spend close

to a billion dollars during the present year in an extraordinary effort to se cure sufficient equipment, power and track, including new road to make it possible to handle the great amount of traffic being offered to them. If the car and locomotive builders and the steel railmakers do their part the year will be a record one in the three indus-

will be a record one in the three indus-tries mentioned. It is estimated that if the manufac-turers are equal to the task between 30,000 and 350,000 freight cars will be added to the total equipment of the railways of the United States, fully 50,000 passenger cars will be built and more than 6,000 locomotives will be added to the steam power which is now available. It is said now that the railroads will pay fully \$92,000,000 for steel rails dur-ing the present year. If this proves true the steel mills will have to turn out about 3,300,000 tons of that product. #### NO DECISION REACHED.

#### St. Paul May or May Not Build Pacific Coast Extension.

All lists, contracts or agree-ments in relation to the same are de-clared unlawful, and it is ordered that they be annulled and each person be released from any such agreement or understanding. cific Coast Extension. New York, May 16.—At a meeting of the executive committee of the Chica-go, Milwaukee & St. Paul railway yes-terday, the question of discontinuing work on the road's Pacific coast exten-sion was discussed, but after the meet-ing one of the officers of the road said that no decision and been reached. President Earling's attitude in re-gard to postponing the work on this new line, for which \$100,000,000 of new stock was issued in last December, is understood to be that it would be well to postpone the work if it can be done without embarrassment and without incurring too much loss due to inter-rupting work of so great magnitude. It will be left to the directors, how-ever, to decide whether the work has been suspended. The next regular meeting of the full board will be held on the bar released from any such agreement or understanding. The Tri-Partite proprietors are per-petually enjoined from entering into any agreement with themselves or any of the other defendants by which they might, as alleged, refuse to sell, or dis-criminate in their sales to persons or corporations, whose names have ap-peared on any list or document pub-lished or issued by any of the defend-ants purporting to contain the names of persons refusing to maintain prices. They are also enjoined from fixing the price at which the articles of their manufacture shall be sold by the wholesale dealer to the consumer, and from including in the terms of sale the schedule prices fixed or adopted by any percentum of the retail dealers in the market. All such contracts are declared yold and all persons are declared to be


#### Chicago City Rallway Plans to Make Extensive Improvements.

Chicago, May 10 .- It will cost the Chicago City Rallway \$16,000,000 to cury out the rehabilitation of its lines. during the next three years. This was the estimate given the company yes-terday by the beard of supervising en-gineers. It is estimated that it will cost the Union Traction company \$24,-000,000 to rehabilitate the service on the north and west sides. The beard made its estimate for the south side in response to the inquiry of President Thomas E. Mitten. The curl-neers reserved the right to call for the \$16,000,000 as rapidly as the progress of the work warrants. It is considered likely that improve-ments costing between \$3,000,000 and \$5,000,000 will be completed within the next year. ### WILL ISSUE NEW STOCK.

A Hundred Million of "System" Common to be Placed on Market,

A Hundred Million of "System" Com-mon to be Placed on Market, New York, May 10.-Directors of the Union Pacific and Southern Pa-cific companies voted to place tha statistics of the two companies on a quarterly instead of a semi-annihi dividend basis. As a result a quarter-ly dividend of 11's per cent on South-ern Pacific stock and a quarterly fivi-dend of 21's per cent on Union Pacific stock was declared. These dividends will be payable July 1 and are at the same time rate per annum as the last previous declarations. The directors of the Southern Pa-cific voted to offer for subscription preferred stock to the extent of 1a per cent of the company's total capi-talization, or \$26,000,000. Anouncement was made after the meeting that the directors of the Union Pacific will call a stockholders' meeting in June to authorize an issue of \$100,000,000 common stock against which will be convertible into stock at 175 at any time within five years. The bonds will be offered at 90. In explanation of the proposal Union Pacific issue, E. H. Harriman read a statement which showed that the road's requirements amounted to \$63,700,000. He stated that its total free assets were about \$243,000,000, exclusive of 1,600 miles of completed railway. He estimated the net carnings of

railway.

Alway. He estimated the net earnings of the Union Pacific for 1906-7 at \$22,-500,000 as compared with \$20,615,000 in the previous year. All income he estimated at \$35,300,000 and the bal-ance over all charges, requirements and dividends at \$12,000,000. Mr, Harriman estimated the bet carnings of Southern Pacific for 1906-7 at \$44,700,000 to be compared with \$27,432,000 in the previous year.
