

# COLIN AND CELT WILL NOT ENTER

Keane's Star Colts Are Out of Tomorrow's Big Race Card.

## UNVANQUISHED HAS FEVER

With Leg in Treacherous Condition Best Horse on the Turf is On Sick List.

New York, June 25.—Neither Colin nor Celt, the mainstays of James R. Keane's big stable this year, will start tomorrow in the \$25,000 Coney Island Jockey club stakes at Sheepshead Bay. Both are seriously ailing. The sheath of the tendon of one of Colin's forelegs is so feverish that Dr. Sheppard, the veterinarian, declared after an examination, that it would be dangerous to work the colt for the rich stake tomorrow.

Celt has developed a quarter crack in one hoof. This has appeared since his recent very fast workout in preparation for the same stake. Colin's trouble may be cured in time, but neither this colt nor Colin may be seen in a race for a long time to come. Mr. Keane last night said: "I am very sorry to have to say that both my colts are under professional treatment, and I do not know when they will appear again in public. Colin was examined by Dr. Sheppard and he strongly advised us not to work him tomorrow for the Coney Island Jockey club stakes on Saturday. The sheath of one of his tendons is feverish, hence a strong workout might mean a breakdown. Celt has a quarter crack, and, of course, he will not be raced until it is remedied. I know that Colin will be disappointed, because they have to me a great affection for my colts, but this is a matter which no one can control. Our loss is some one else's gain. Colin has never been beaten, having won 13 races in his two years on the turf, and about \$175,000. He won about \$150,000 last year including the Turfity.

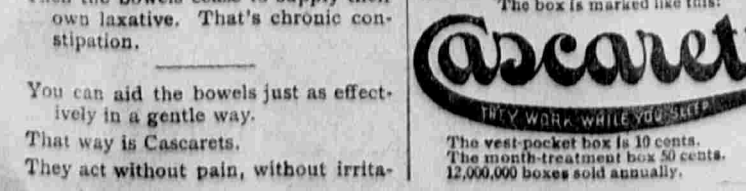

Yale was beaten. It was not longer a race, and Harvard swung alone, still keeping up in the racing clip and crossing the finishing line with a regular "avish-savish" to the very end. As Harvard sped to the line "boom, boom, and foot, foot," went up in deafening chorus from the myriad craft while from bank to bank rolled a chorus of Harvard yells, and from every truck and main mast broke out the triumphant, crimson and bewildering mass of kaleidoscopic color.

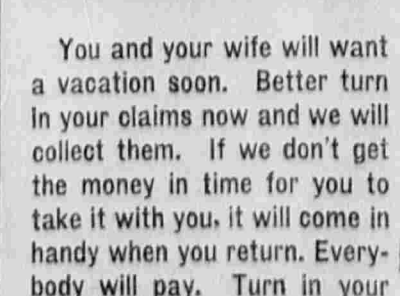
