DETAILS OF SAD DROWNING.

Statement of Joseph Jacob Respecting Death of Mrs Nerden. Special Correspondence,

Pleasant Grove, Utah Co., Feb. 10 .-To correct erroneous impressions that were circulated respecting the recent drowning in Prove river, the "News" has been requested to give space to the following statement concerning the sad affair, through which Mrs. Nerden lost

The accident happened at Carter's The accident happened at Carter's dugway, not through carelessness, but through the solicitude of Mr. Nerden to alleviate his wife's guffering from toothache. At the critical moment he attempted to arrange the quilt to make her more comfortable. The box was thrown from the bobs, and all par-ties from the box; Mr. Nerden and myself were thrown upon a shelving foun-dation rock, about eight feet below the level of the road; and Mrs. Nerden was

thrown into the stream.

Mr. Nerden and myself were both stunned by the fall; had I rolled into the stream in my condition, two deaths would have been recorded instead of one. When I regained con-sciousness the lady was at least 30 yards below us in the center of the narrow, swift running stream.

As soon as his condition rendered it

possible, Mr. Nerden climbed up the bank and ran below to rescue his wife, but she had disappeared. As soon as I recovered I got back on the road and also ran below thinking that she would float, but her body did not raise to the surface after disappearing. As Mr. Nerden saw he could not save his wife alone, he went for assistance and did all that was possible to rescue her. was three quarters of an hour before any help arrived to search for the body,

Today the young man can walk in the house without crutches, the seres are all healed and bones growing stronger every day. The writer feels it but justice to make this fact public, as in his estimation doctors are generally in too much of a hurry to amputate limbs and cripple people for life.
