## W. J. LONG AND THE PRESIDENT

Former Says Question Between Them is no Longer One of Animals But of Men.

HAS ATTACKED HIS VERACITY.

Tells Chief Executive That He Cannot Take Refuge Behind His Presidential Office and Maintain Silence,

Stamford, Conn., May 28.-Dr. William J. Long today made public a letter sent by him to President Roosavelt. The letter says in part;

"To his Excellency, Theodore Roosevett. President of the United States: Dear Sir-The issue between you and me is no longer one of animals, but of men. It is not chiefly a matter of natural history, but of truth and personal honor. In a recent magazine article you deliberately attack me as well, as my book. You have used the enormous influence of your official posttion to discredit me as a man, to injure my reputation and incidentally to make a poor man even poorer by destroying, if possible, the sale and influ-

ence of his work.

"In my book I have given the results of long years of watching animals in the wilderness with no other object than to study their habits and, so far as man cau, to understand the myssery of their domestic life. In my preface I have stated, and I now repeat the statement, that every incident I have recorded from my own observation is true as far as an honest, educated man can see and understand the truth. In your recent attack this is what you chiefly deny. I have spoken the truth, and you accuse me of deliberate falsehood and misrepresentation. As president of the United States you have gone out of your way publicly to injure the private citizen who was attending strictly to his own business; as a man you have accused of falsehood another man whose ideals of truth and honor are quite as high as ence of his work. of truth and honor are quite as high as

"This is the whole Issue between us. I meet is squarely and so must you. If I have spoken falsely, if in my book or words of mine I have intentionally deceived any child or man regarding animal life, I promise publicly to retract every such word and never to write another animal book. On the other hand, if I show to any disinterested person that you have accused me falsely. You must publicly withdraw your accusation and apolosize. As a man and as president, no other honorable course is open to you. You base your recent charges chiefly on the matter of a big white wolf kiling a young caribou by a bite in the chest, described by me in 'Northern Trails.'

"You declare the thing to be a mathematical impossibility, and declare by no poesibility, could a wolf perform such a feat."

Dr. Long declares he knows from his own observation and from the testimony of Indians that wolves do sometimes kill in this way, and then quotes the signed and witnessed statement of S. K. Hapidan, an educated Sioux Indian, who states he saw a horse which a wolf had killed by tearing its chest. In addition to this, Dr. Long says he himself had seen a deer which had been slain in this manner by a wolf, and further recites that his Indian, Matty Mitchell of Bonny Bay, Newfoundland, declares that the big white woif frequently kills caribou in this manner.

"You cannot at this stage, Mr. Roosestt, take refuge behind the presidential office and maintain silence. You have forfeited your right to that silence by breaking it, by coming out in sublication to attack a private citizen, if your talk of a square deal is not all a sham, if your frequent moral preaching is not hypocricy. I call upon you as president, as a man, to come out and admit the error and injustice of your charge in the same open and public way in which you made it."

Complaint was made to the navy lepartment by Lieut, J. V. Babcock, ommanding the United States steam-

en Truxton, on May 16. The substance of this report and position taken by Secy. Metcalf in the matter are given by him in a letter to Gov. Swanson of Virginia, date Mey 22, Secy. Metcalf says:

"This department is in receipt of an unofficial report from the commanding officer of the United States steamer Truxton, dated Pine Beach, Va., May 16, 1907, with regard to a case of disrespect to the service uniform which has occurred during the eojourn of the floillia off Pine Beach. "The commanding officer of the Truxton states that the dancing pavilion of Pine Beach refuses admittance to men in blue jacket uniforms; at the same time granting unqualified admittance to soldiers in uniform. S. E. Lane, gunner's mate of the first class, was, on the 15th instant refused admission to the dancing pavilion, the manager stating that under no circumstances would men in blue jacket uniform by a dance other clothes would be furnished them. Request was made to see the 'other clothes' mentioned, and the petty officer was shown a diressing room where a stock of white clothes was kept, 'very much similar to the regulation mess attendant aniform.' On being informed that the matter would be reported to the proper authorities the manager stated that the action would do no good and would be a waste of time.

"This park is advertised as being under the management of the Columbia Amusement company, incorporated, W. F. Crawl, president." "As the navy is doing everything in its power to make the exposition a success, your attention is invited to this instance of apparent discrimination against the service uniform and it is believed that some action should be taken thereon by withholding license or otherwise. If such practices be permitted the result will, this department feels assured, prove alghly prejudicial to the naval service by causing the uniform of the navy to be looked upon with disfavor."

Washington, May 28. - President Roosevelt left here tonight at 9:10 for his trip west, to be away until Satur-

his trip west, to be away until Saturday afternoon.

The presidential party occupied the private car Magnet, attached to the regular train over the Baltimore & Ohio railroad.

Tomorrow the president is to attend Mrs. McKinley's funeral at Canton; on Memorial day he is to speak at the unveiling of Gen. Lawton's statue at Indianapolis, and on Friday he is to address the Michigan legislature at the capitol building at Lansing briefly in the morning, and in the afternoon is to speak to the students at the agricultural college there. Following the exercises at the college there is to be a reception at the railroad station of a delegation from the associated Harvard clubs, after which the president will leave for Washington.

The president was accompanied by Secys. Root, Garfield and Wilson, Secy. Loeb, Herman Kohlsaat of Chicago, Surgeon Gen. and Mrs. Rixey and Asst. Secy. Latta. The members of the cabinet and Mr. Kohlsaat are going only as far as Canton to attend Mrs. McKinley's funeral, after which they will return to Washington. The remainder of the party will continue with the president through the entire trip.

#### MAYOR M'CLELLAN VETOES PUBLIC UTILITIES BILL

New York, May 28,—Mayor McClellan today recorded his official disapproval of the public utilities bill, which he sent back to the legislature, where, it is expected, it will be re-passed without the mayor's signature.

In a memorandum accompanying the measure the mayor explains that, while he is in accord with the general principles embodied in the bill. It is as a whole so destructive of the principle of home rule that bilt one course was open to him. This was his basic objection, but the mayor adds, in effect, that such legislation would result inevitably in the apopintment of partisan commissioners who in times of party stress would use their power to coerce the transportation companies into furnishing funds with which to corrupt the electorate. Senator Bourne of Oregon Charges it With Holding Up Land for Speculative Purposes.

RETARDS COUNTRY'S PROGRES

Department of Justice Has Had Ques tion of Certain Lands Under Consideration for Some Time.

Washington, May 28,-Senator Bourn

of Oregon again consulted with th president today about the case of the Southern Pacific Rallway company which he charges is holding up approximately 3,000,000 acres of public land, much of which is in Oregon, that should be opened to settlement. Th senator says that grants covering the land, which originally were for 6,000,000 acres, were made with the understanding that the land should be opened up to settlement at a nominal price per acre. A great deal of it, he says, was sold at \$15 an acre and half of it was withheld from sale altogether. In the meantime, the senator says, the progress of the country is being retarded and he intimates that the railway company is holding the laud for speculative purposes. Mr. Bourne is urging that legal proceedings be instituted to compel the company to dispose of the lands. He says that some of the grants were to companies which have been since absorbed by the Southern Pacific. The department of justice has for some time had under consideration the question of certain lands held by the Southern Pacific Hailroad company in Oregon under grants to railroad companies which have been absorbed by the Southern Pacific. A preliminary report on the matter has been made by Nathan V. Harlan, United States atterney for the third division of Aiaska, who has been engaged in the investigation while absent from his post of duty on account of ill health.
