BASIN, WYOMING. THE BIG HORN COUNTRY.

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Routes By Which Trekkers May Reach that Goodly Land.

Special Correspondence, Basin, Big Horn County, Feb. 16 .-

The good people of Burlington ward have been enjoying a spiritual feast, Apostle A. O. Woodruff, accompanied by Elder Byron Sessions of the Stake presidency, and twelve other Elders from different parts of Utah and Idaho, arrived at Burlington the evening of the 9th inst. holding meetings Satu day evening and nearly all day Sunday, although Sunday was quite blustery the meeting house was filled to over flowing.

Up to within the past four or five days we have had a most beautiful winter; we have no snow as yet worth mentioning, there is just about enough on the range to afford water for the sheep and cattle. It has turned warmer again today. For the benefit of those wishing to

either move to or come and see this country, a line of travel from two different points is here marked out, name-ly Montpeller, Idaho, and Evanston, Wyo. Those coming via Montpeller will first go to Cokeville, then over what is known as the Dempsey trail to Ham's Fork, thence on same trail to Green cific Springs and further to South Pass, via Sweetwater Bridge, from South Pass to Lander from there Pass to Lander from there via Arapahoe agency to Meeteetse which is on the Gray Bull river, follow that river down to Burlington. It is about 285 miles from Montpelier, Bear lake, to Burlington. Those wishing to come from points farther south can come through Evanston, from there to Diamondville, sixty miles, from there to Slate Creek ferry, fifty miles, from there to Big Sandy, twenty miles, up Big Sandy until they connect with the old emigrant trail and from there to Pacific Springs, fifty miles. From Big Sandy the road is already described. The distance is 378 miles from Evanston

to Burlington. Anyone wishing to come from directly south of here can come to either Rock Springs or Green River City, Wyo., from either of these points it is about the same distance to Duman's Ranch, from there over to Pa-cific Creek, follow that up to Pacific Springs, from which place the road is already described. If the winter continues to be an open one all over Wyoming as it has been so far people coming here will be perfect-

ly safe in starting out from the 1st to 15th of April. There is little doubt that the railroad will be built into the basin within the next two years, the result of which means the development of the resources of this great country within a short With the present mail service namely twenty-three hours from the railroad, we are able to get the Deseret News from two to three days after it is published. We also have telephone connection with the outside world, the line touches Basin, Otto, Burlington, Meeteetse and Cody, all of which are in the basin, the line connects with the railroad at Red Lodge, Mont.



FRANKLIN, IDAHO. TARRED AND FEATHERED.

Betrayer of a Young Girl Roughly Handled by Three Assailants. Special Correspondence.

Franklin, Oneida Co., Ida., Feb. 15 .-In yesterday's Herald appeared a statement about a tar and feathering scrape in Franklin which occurred on Monday night last. To correct a few errors in the published report the following is

A few months ago it was reported that a young girl by the name of May Rob-inson had been betrayed by a young man by the name of Harry Bennington. man by the name of Harry Bennington. He refused to marry her, but married another. His victim recently gave birth to a child but never rallied, and after suffering eighteen days of terrible agony, died of blood poisoning. Dr. Adamson, of Richmond, attending her, and did all that was possible to save her life. The young man Bennington acknowledged that he was the father of acknowledged that he was the father of her child, and the cause of her trouble. The Herald article stated that the people of Fraklin feit very indignant wards the young man and went to his home and took him and tarred and feathered him. This is not correct, as there were only three persons engaged in the affair. On last Monday night hree persons watched Harry home from his work, about 7:30 o'clock; while crossing a lot, which he always did, as it was a cut off to his home, and while in the act of going over some bars, three men, unknown to him, feli upon him, tied and gagged him, tore his clothes off and then plastered him from head to foot with tar and then put a lot of feathers on him and went and left him, but cut his bands so that he could run home, which he did as fast as he could. He burst into the house and scared his young wife, and her mother nearly into fits. They immediately sent for Mr. Peter Bowcut, our village po liceman, who, after finding what was done, went out immediately to try and find out the perpetrators of the deed. The people of Franklin do not believe in mob violence and because three unknown persons committed the deed the community feel it is an injustice to condemn the whole people. It is true the feeling has been very strong against the young man, but it is about the same against those that took the law in their own hands. The people of Franklin are law abiding and lovers of fair play. The village officers and the policeman are doing all in their power
