OCDEN THE COMING TOWN

So Considers Governor Sparks of Nevada, Who Will Build Seven Story Hotel.

Mr. Sparks was in the city yesterday and made the announcement. He said: "I consider Ogden the coming town o the west, and I propose to give you a practical demonstration of my belief
