

Pennsylvania Conference.

The Pennsylvania Conference of the Northern States Union was held at Littleton, West Virginia, Saturday and Sunday, March 20th and 21st. An introductory meeting was held on Friday evening and then were three meetings on each day of the conference, with a break for dinner between the two sessions on Saturday. All the Elders, except Elder J. C. Keith, who could not attend, having a comprehensive charge to travel, and Elder Wm. H. Freeman, who returned home during the present month on account of the death of his wife, were present. Presiding Elder from Washington, D. C., and Elder Orion Whittaker from Kansas City, joined us Saturday. President Maynes chaired the speakers to confirm their rights to the first principles of the Union. The moderator of the morning session was taken up by Elder Joe. Ward, who spoke upon the necessity of obeying the ministerial authorities.

The afternoon session, like the previous one, was interesting. The speakers were Elders David H. Morris, A. C. Smith, Wm. H. Freeman, Wm. G. Whittaker, and Presidents J. W. Maynes, all of whom spoke intelligently on the subjects which it was necessary for them to say, few of us being present then for they knew the feelings of the hand, and the speakers spoke especially on the subjects of the organization. In the afternoon the high-sounding charges of last year would be compared to accept the truth or falsehood.

The evening meeting was comparative, though again a large audience attended by Elders Goss, Whittaker and Jason H. Davis, and others.
