increase in votes, and the fact that this increase represents permanent
growth.

FINE WHEAT HARVEST.

Samples of the first wheat harvest
from the dry farm of the Cedar Valley
Land & Improvement company, at Cedar
Valley, Utah, are being shown in
this city today. The grain is remark-
ably fine in quality and brought at sale
84 cents at the threshing. Yields as high
as 30 bushels to the acre were har-
vested, though this was not the average.
The ground was not prepared for
planting and the farmers were not ex-
pecting a yield of such proportions.
Seed planted this fall now stands
four inches high and prepara-
tion of ground for 1910 plant-
ing has already been undertaken.
It being necessary to anticipate a
season one year ahead of time. When the
ground is plowed and fully prepared for
planting, the company is sanguine in
its expectations for a flattering yield,
the climate and soil of the locality hav-
ing been fully demonstrated as adapted
to wheat farming in this year's test.
