THS people should bear in mind that the election for the ratification of the Staty Constitution, framed by the Convention of Delegates and published in the DESERET NEWS, will take place on Monday, May 22nd. It will commence one hour after sunrice and close at sunset. The justice of the peace in each precinct is to act as senior judge of election, and to appoint a clerk, who is required to keep a list of all persons voting. Every c.tizen of the United States, tw. nty-one years of age, residing in the Territory is entitled to vote without respect to sex, creed, color, condition, or family relations. The Edmunds bill has no effect upon the election of next Monday. It is a popular movement and is of great importance. The e who don't like it need not support it. Every friend of the rights of the people will go to the polls next Monday. They who do not vote will give evidence either that they are opposed to the liberty of the masses and the continuance of the galling bondage of the territorial system, or that they are too slothful and indifferent to move a slep towards demanding freedom.
