PIOCHE. Nev., June 6.- The jury in the Savage-Miller murder trial re-turned a verdict of "not guilty," after being out 55 minutes. William Savage and Michael Miller

vere on trial for the murder of John Reveland Carter on the 4th of March, 50% Carter was foreman of the Boston-Pioche mine and had discharged Savage for the supposed blasting of some station timbers. Carter abused Savage at the time of his discharge and is claimed to have threated to kill him if he came on the property again. Savage had to go back to get some blankets, and went to Carter to get permission. As soon as Carter saw Savage and Miller coming back he flow into a rage and it is claimed he made a motion to draw a gun, saying at he same time he was going to kill savage and "do it now," together with other abusive language, whereupon Savage drew a gun and began to shoot, thinking Carter was in earnest, although he was probably only "bluffing." Two shots were fired, one entering the abdomen and the other the right shoulder, inflicting wounds from which
