

Should Burns on his arrival in San Francisco feel in the mood for making excuses, he may claim that it was the postponement of the date of the match from May 30 to July 4 that caused him to be derelict with his money. He had made arrangements to leave Los Angeles for San Francisco a day or two after his affair with O'Brien, but on learning of the change of date he terried in the southland.

Of course, this is not a gilt-edged excuse at that. Burns is anything but a sreen hand at the matchmaking game, and he knows that a plea of non-arrival does not hold where a clause in the articles calls for the posting of forfeits on a certain date. There is no occasion for a bugilist to act as convoy or bodyguard to his forfeit money.
