

TWO UTAH TEAMS WERE THE WINNERS

Spokane and Boise Go Down to Defeat in First Ball Game.

LOCALS PLAYED FINE GAME.

Clouted the Ball All Over the Field; Were Fast on Bases and Did All Around Good Work.

The Pacific National League baseball season opened yesterday afternoon at Spokane and Boise. In the former city 1,200 fans saw the game, while 1,500 saw the contest at Boise. Salt Lake was at Spokane and Ogden at Boise. Both Utah teams carried off the honors.

The Salt Lake team outplayed the Indians at every stage of the game, making the final score 7 to 2. Ogden defeated Boise, 9 to 4.

Thornton was not in the game for Salt Lake, but Tover, the pitcher, held down first sack and his work at that station was a surprise to everybody as he moved around as though the place was his regular position. Durham pitched a fine game for Salt Lake and had the Redskins at his mercy throughout, allowing but six scattered hits.

The Salt Lake team proved effective at bat; did great work in the field, and was very fast on bases. In the third inning, Salt Lake began to score and was never in danger of losing the game. The detailed score of the game follows:
