VOTE FOR SCHOOL BONDS TOMORROW

Ogden Citizens Will Decide on High School Proposition—List of Polling Places.

FOUR COUNTY FAIR ASS'N.

Judicial Convention July 22.—Mrs. Rice Sues for Divorce—Driver Beats Horse to Death.

Ogden, July 9.—Tomorrow the taxpayers and citizens of Ogden will decide whether they want a new high school or not by the result of the election on the school bonds question. If the \$75,000 bonds to be used for a new high school to be erected on the vacant lot at the corner of Twenty-fifth street and Monroe avenue which was so generously given by Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Kiesel, are wanted the voter will vote yes. But if he wants the same old present high school building which has been condemned both from fire protection and sanitary points of view and which will have to be remodeled this fall at a cost that will reach \$40,000, then the voter will vote "No."

So certain are the leaders in the movement for the new school that the bond question will go through that they are ready to announce the result as being favorable. There has been little or no opposition shown in the forthcoming bond election and if there has been any fighting the question going on it has been very secret. One or two reports have reached the publicity committee of the Civic League that a new insurgent had appeared on the horizon but when the campaign for progress and education appeared they were put to flight.

The movement for new bonds has received the endorsement of the Ogden Trades and Labor assembly, the Chamber of Commerce, the Retail Butchers' association and many other clubs and associations. The Civic Improvement League which was instrumental in urging the board of education to have the question of bonds re-submitted to the people, has had committees working with a great deal of zeal to arouse enthusiasm for bonds and they have succeeded beautifully. The committee has had published interviews with all the leading business men of the city.

At the session of the Weber club last evening the following resolution was adopted:

"Whereas, The Hon. Fred J. Kiesel and Mrs. Kiesel have tendered to the city of Ogden a magnificent site for a high school and which has been accepted by the board of education, and

"Whereas, The needs of Ogden city are numerous and urgent for a new and modern high school, and more room for the grade schools so that the children of this city shall be properly cared for,

"Therefore, Be it resolved, that the board of directors of the Weber club heartily and unequivocally endorse the call by the board of education for a bond issue of \$75,000, with which to erect a new high school building to cost not less than \$100,000.

Be it further resolved, That the directors of the Weber club recommend that its members do all in their power to aid and further the bond issue and the board of education in its great work."

BIG FOUR COUNTY FAIR.

Organized by Officials of Weber, Boxelder, Davis and Morgan Counties.
Ogden, July 9.—Twenty-eight mayors, county commissioners and other officials from the counties of Weber, Morgan, Davis and Boxelder met at the Weber club and perfected the organization of the Big Four county fair, which is to be held at the grounds of the Inter-Mountain Fair association in Ogden during the latter part of September.

The organization of a board of control was completed with William Glasman, president and director general, and four vice presidents, one from each of the counties, as follows: Commissioner A. W. Valentine, Boxelder; Commissioner John Walsh, Davis county; Horticultural Inspector Hyrum Phillips, Morgan county; and David McKay from Weber county.

A board of protests and appeals was then formed consisting of one representative from each county, and one additional to be selected by these from their respective counties.

A motion was put and carried that each of the counties shall have a day set apart during the fair to be known as Davis, Morgan and Boxelder county days.

The board of control passed a resolution adopting the rule and regulations with the premium list of the Inter-Mountain Fair association as the rules under which the Big Four fair shall operate for this year.

JUDICIAL CONVENTION.

The judicial central committee of the Republican party held session in the court house yesterday afternoon pursuant to a call, present were: Joseph S. Welch, Morgan county; J. H. Burlington and H. W. Stable, Davis county; and F. J. Handershot of Weber county. The two latter were chosen secretary and chairman of the meeting respectively.

The date of the judicial convention was fixed for July 22, 1908, at 11 a. m. in the court room of the county court house in Ogden. The appointment of delegates is as follows: Weber, 67; Davis, 20; and Morgan, 7. The date of holding the primaries in Weber county was fixed for Monday evening, July 20.

MRS. RICE SUES FOR DIVORCE.

Mary Rice has brought suit in the district court against Joseph S. Rice upon the grounds of cruelty. The complaint alleges that the couple were married in Ogden March 24, 1904, and have two children. It is further alleged that on June 25 of this year the defendant threatened to kill the plaintiff, and called her vile names; on June 27 he threw her out of the door of the home and her clothes after her, and told her not to return. The couple are residents of Pleasant View in this county. Mrs. Rice asks for a decree of divorce, custody of the children and alimony.

SUPERIOR HONEY CO.
Articles of incorporation of the Superior Honey company were filed with the county clerk yesterday afternoon. The incorporators are: Fred W. Redfield, Spencer Stone, Jay, Sarah and Lottie Redfield. The company, which will deal in honey and bees, has a capital stock of \$25,000.

The Nelson-Vogel company, which will deal in real estate and securities, filed its articles with the county clerk yesterday. The capital stock is \$19,500, fully subscribed. The incorporators are: W. A. Hickel, Mattie Nelson, Mattie Vogel, David and Lamar Nelson.

BEATS A HORSE TO DEATH.
P. H. Whitaker, driver of a meat wagon for Cardon Brothers of Five Points, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Naylin and Officer Fred Taut, upon the charge of beating a horse to death.

From the statement of eye-witnesses, it appears that the horse in question balked and refused to go. Then Whitaker resorted to the club method. He secured a large piece of apple wood and started laying to. At first the animal tried to move, but before it could do so the heartless monster struck the horse several strong blows over the head and the horse dropped dead.

A number of indignant citizens surrounded Whitaker. It is stated, and were on the point of dealing roughly with him when they were informed that the officers had been communicating with and were en route to Five Points to arrest Whitaker. Through some misapprehension Whitaker got away from the people and started to drive a meat wagon with another horse attached to it through the western settlements of the county.

When the officers took up his trail he had more than an hour's start. But he was soon overhauled and placed under arrest. He was placed in the county jail and will be given a hearing before Judge Murphy later.

Whitaker was this forenoon released on \$100 bonds, pending a preliminary hearing later.

BALL AT SYLVAN PARK.

Tonight at Sylvan park occurs the first grand ball of the Chamber of Commerce of Ogden and Weber county, which has been holding its first picnic at the grounds today. The program for the day is scheduled to begin at 3:30 p. m., at which time the business houses will close for the day.
