tting Forth Plan Amended New York, May 24 .- It has been de ided by the reorganization committee of the Denver & Southwestern railroad ccording to the Herald to abandon th

plan proposed last October, and today a circular will be distributed to gena circular will be distributed to gen-eral mortgage bondholders authorizing an amended plan. This amendment is severe and is in reality a foreclosure of the general mortgage, altogether on account of the character of the pledge it will be unnecessary to appoint a re-ceiver for the property or go into court to bring about foreclosure. The proposed plan completely wines

to bring about foreclosure. The proposed plan conpletely wipes out the present stock of the company and gives the united security to the general mortgage bondholders. A new emeral mortgage bondholders. A new company will be incorporated, with no funded debt, and its stock aggregating \$5,500,000 will be given pro rata to the present holders of general mortgage bonds who assent to the plan. present general mortgage bonds there are standing \$4,555,060.

The original plan in order to become operative required the assent of all the outstanding bonds. All but \$124, all 00 were deposited with the commit Owing to the fact that the general

mortgage is in reality a collateral trust mortgage the instrument can be foreclosed without recourse to the courts. Instead of treading the customary le-gal path the trustee of the general mortsage will simply offer for sale at auction the stocks and bonds deposited as securities for the general mortgage bonds.

These securities compose the units which were welded together in order to form the Denver & Southwestern in 1899 which controlled all the out-lets from the gold fields of Cripple Creek until the Colorado Springs and Cripple Creek district railroad was organized by mine owners. They have a par value of \$4,625,000. The reorganization plan, according to the circular to be issued today, pro-vides for the purchase of these se-curities by the committee in behalf of the bondholders. The plan further provides that the board of directors for the first year shall be appointed by the reorganization committee. These securities compose the units
