

CURIOUS TRAITS OF GENIUS.

Under the title of "Curious Traits of Men of Genius," Prof. Lombroso contributes to the Paris some interesting facts.

It is pointed out that the great majority of men of genius are to be found in either of two classes—the tallest or the shortest. Among men of average mental attainments, the greater number are of average height—of this class 16 per cent are of high, 16 per cent of low and 68 per cent of medium stature. Turning to men of genius, 27 per cent are low, 41 per cent high and only 22 per cent medium.

Examples of short geniuses are Epictetus, George Eliot and A. C. Swinburne; of the tall variety are Petrarch, Goethe, Tennyson. An equally well-defined statement may be made regarding thin and stout men. Of stout geniuses may be mentioned Victor Hugo, Renan, Lee, Rossini and Balzac; of thin are Pascal, Kepler, Voltaire and Gluck.

Most men of genius have a high brain capacity. Lebon, on examining the skulls of 26 French men of genius, found that they yielded an average capacity of 1732 cubic centimeters—a little more than 200 in excess of the average.

Of the brains of 12 famous German

men studied by Wagner and Buchoff, eight had either a decidedly low or a very high capacity. Dollinger, 1297, and Liebig, 1352, for instance.

On the other hand, one had long believed that a great development of brain circumference, together with symmetrical beauty of the face, were general characteristics of the man of genius; but here also the exceptions are numerous, an extraordinary emanation of the skull being frequently noticeable.

We have not dealt with inflammation of the brain membranes, shown in such a case as Dostoevsky's; and we may contrast with the facial beauty and harmonious skull form of Helmholtz, Dante and Schopenhauer the abnormally large features (hereditary) of such men as Skoda and Nobilis, who possessed almost idiotic looks. It is

interesting to note that Clement VI is said to have acquired genius as a result of a blow which his skull received in his childhood. The Australian novelist, Marcus Clarke, had a similar experience.

A common characteristic of the creative genius is contempt for the work of others. Napoleon would have nothing to do with steam, and Richelieu threw into a lunatic asylum the man who discovered it; Voltaire denied the value of fossils to science. Darwin jeered at hypnotism, and Virchow absolutely denied Darwinism and criminal anthropology.

Absent-mindedness is very common with the man of genius. Newton one day rammed his nose into his pipe. Tucherer once forgot his own name. The Archbishop of Munster, sitting on the door of his visitors' room a notice which read, "The master of

the house is out," remained there, awaiting his own return!

The gods must have an especial fondness for poets, for they have a decided way of dying young. Of 46 cases, nine poets died between the ages of 26 and 37—Byron, Shelley, Keats, Leopardi and Poe among them. Of 33 artists and sculptors, the average age attained was 46; one, Fortuny, dying young, aged 38. Of 39 musicians with an average age of 62 years, Schubert was 35 years old when he died, and Verdi 88; while four others died young—Bellini, Bizet, Schubert, Mendelssohn.

Poets are often precocious. Dante wrote a sonnet to Beatrice when he was 9 years old; Mozart gave a concert at 6; Tasso wrote verse at 19, and Pascal at 15. It is, on the other hand, true that some men have been

backward; Albrecht, Wren, Humboldt, Linnaeus, Flaubert and Dostoevsky, for instance.

Heard of music has been characteristic of some persons of genius, especially in literature, philosophy and history—e. g., Johnson, Victor Hugo, Catherine II, Zola, Napoleon, Pontenelle and Gautier. On the other hand, among ardent lovers of music have stood Aristotle, Dostoevsky, Goethe, Carlyle, Moore and Ruskin.

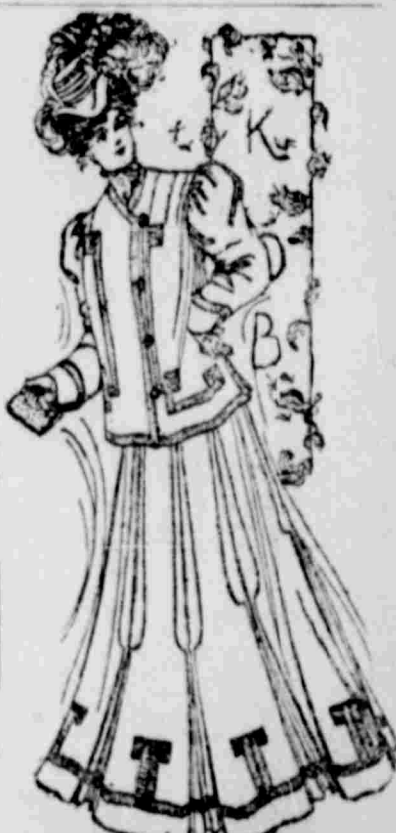
