BALTIMORE HAS A MILLION DOLLAR FIRE.

Baltimore, June 13.-The greatest fire since the conflagration of 1994, involving a property loss of about \$1.-100,000 and the probable loss of two lives, occurred at an early hour this morning on the water front. For a time the entire harbor front was threatened with destruction on

the north side the flames being with difficulty kept within the confines of the wharf of the Merchants and Miners' Transportation company and on the south side a stubborn battle being fought to prevent a wholesale destruc-tion of property by the fire spread-ing from the steamship Essex which, with six harges, was hurned.

The fire started at 1:30 e'clock, but at 5 o'clock was still burning. At that hour the flames on the steamer Essex had been extinguished and the shell if the vessel was badly listed from the water in her hold.

Two members of the crew of the Essex are missing and it is believed that they were hurned to death or umped overboard and were drowned. Their names are Edward Atkinson, abin assistant, and John Costello, secnd steward.

Five other man were rescued with difficulty by the tug Mary, two of them narrowly escaping death in the flames or drowning, as they were forced to make flying leaps to the rescuing ves-sel from the deck of the Essex as the former boot pulled away from the burning stramer. urning steamer
