HORRORS OF LOOTING.

They Are Inflaming the Minds of Natives Against Europeans.

London, Aug. S.—The horrors of the looting of Casa Blanca by native tribes-men are becoming known today, and their recital is inflaming the minds of the natives against all Europeans. The situation in various coast towns is worse. The natives are excited. A holy war is being preached at Babat. Antiworse. The natives are excited. A holy war is being preached at Rabat. Anti-foreign sentiment is growing as a re-sult of the activities of fanatical agita. tors. There is fear of a general out-break. A number of European families are preparing to flee from Tangier. The Angera tribesmen in the immediate vicinity of Tangier are restless and may get out of control. The Moorish author-ities have practically no control of the situation.

ities have practically no control of the situation. There are many complaints among the Europeans that France acted ill-ad-visedly at Casa Blanca in bombarding that town before protection could be arranged for the Jews and Europeans there and elsewhere on the coast and in the interior. The news from Casa Blanca, while conflicting as to the situation there to-day, unites in showing that the bom-bardment was continued for longer than was first supposed and that the lack of an adequate French force to afford protection resulted in opportuni-ty for barbarous looting, rapine and pil-lage, with all the accompaniment of murder and horror. The first French landing parties could not confirel the situation. Moorish authority vanished with the first French gunshot, and law-lessness reigned. It is now reported, however, that between 2,000 and 3,000 French and Spanish marines and blue-jackets are ashore at Casa Blanca and that order has been restored. The Eu-ropeans there are all safe. PARTY FROM THE GALILEE.

"Singly, and carrying disjointed rifles, concealed in valkes to avoid suspirion, a party of the Galilee's men had been conveyed Saturday to the French con-sulate, where they took up their posi-tion on the terrace of the roof that commanded the foreshore and a corner of the town and also took in the water gate batteries from the rear.

"A furious musketry fire broke out along the water front, and a dull booming from the old Moorish battery showed that after all Muley Amin and bis soldiers were doing something. They made, however, a poor resistance, and their fire soon ceased.

and their fire soon ceased. "In the meantime the roar of the Gali-lee's guns increased, and shells wera seen bursting all over the Moorish quarter. Wounded men were seen drawing themselves along the streets. In the 20 minutes all seemed over, the fire ceased. This was only a lull, for the firing soon was resumed and was continued intermittently until half-past 6 in the evening.

OFFERED TO SURRENDER.

"Then Muley Amin, with a number other white-robed officials, came to the British consulate offering to surrender. The consul referred them to the French consul. They objected that it was im-possible to approach the French consu-iate because the Spanish consulate was already firing at every Moor who passed in the street and they feared a similar reception from the French con-sulate. Consul Madden thereupon gava to Muley Amin a formal letter of in-

similar reception from the French con-sulate. Consul Madden thereupon gava to Muley Amin a formal letter of in-troduction to the French consul and ad-vised the Moors to carry a white flag. They then went on. Their mission apparently was successful, for the fir-ing soon ceased and at 9 o'clock public criers were about proclaiming that the town was to be shelled no longer. We ate our next meal with quiet minds. "It should be explained that the Eu-ropean residents of Casa Blanca had all along deprecated any action by the French with an insufficient force, and this view the French had been with difficulty induced to adopt, and even overnight, in announcing their inten-tion of occupying the town, the French had apparently believed their fleet would arrive immediately and that no resistance could be expected. In fact, Muley Amin had previously declared his willingness to surrender the town on being informed that resistance would be futile. Whether the resistance of a blunder on the part of some indi-yiduas, or whether it was tempted by the smallnes of the French landing party, it is impossible to ascertain, but what followed was exactly what was

With the firing of the first shot the authority of Muley Amin and his or-ganization vanished. His soldiers bolt-ed with their rifles, leaving the town exposed to rapine and pillage, in which they themselves participated. By break-fast time we began to see men stag-gering along the streets under heavy burdens and fierce white robed Arabs, carrying guns and mounted on fine carrying guns and mounted on fine horses, began to ride about directing the looting operations. Even women were seen carrying loads and assisting in the pillage.

She will await the orders of the French charge d'affaires pending the arrival of the armored cruiser Jeanne d'Arc, as the French officials here consider it is not safe to be without a warship at their disposal. Each fresh batch of news from Casa Blanca confirms previous reports of the horrors of the situation there, and it is believed that the worst features of the massacre in the Jewish quarters have not yet been related. It appears that the bombardment was continued day and night throughout Monday and Tuesday and until 3 o'clock Wednesday morning. At this hour the French flagship gave the signal to cease firing and prepare to send in landing parties. A further force of 200 Franchmen and a few Spaniards were sent ashore. ASSAULT IN JEWISH QUARTER.

Fearing the effect of the shells the besmen had avoided a direct attack tribesmen had avoided a direct attack on the troops, but they made a savage assault in the Jewish quarter, killing the people and pillaging the shops Detachments of French and Spanish troops were told off to protect, the He-brews. Considerable street fighting occurred, the Moors firing from the roofs of their houses into the rurrow thoroughfares. The Eurpean bayon-ets, however, did heavy execution in storming the Moorish houses. Between 100 and 200 Moors were killed and the corpses are lying about the town and in the outskirts, mangled and decomposing and awaiting buriat. The Jewish quarter of Casa Blanca was entirely ruined, and the Jews are in a state of terror. The shells destroyed the principal shrine of the Moorish patron saint.

The bombardment was particularly heavy Monday night, when great num-bers of Kaybles attempted to surprise the town. They were discovered by the searchlights on board the war-ships, and were mercilessly mowed down by the gunfire. It is estimated that some hundreds were killed and wounded by this fire alone. SITUATION ALARMING. Paris, Aug. 8.—Special dispatches from Tangier represent the situation as being alarming on the coast and in the interior.
