James Burke Reports Progress with Ophir Mill-Good Water Supply.

James Burke, the well well known miliwright, returned today from State-line in company with Manager F. H. Lathrop of the Ophir mine. Mr. Burke says good progress is being made with the new \$80,000 lixiviating plant of the Ophir company. The building is all up and covered and preparations are being made to instal the machinery, two cars of which is now at Modena, ready

to be hauled to the mine. If no delay is experienced in getting the balance of the maximery, M. Burke says the mill will be in operation by Sept. 10th. A vey gatifying development has been made by the company about half a mile from the mill, in the shape of fine water supply. sured as, according to measurements just made, the company has a flow of 40,000 gallons per day. A large force is employed at the mine, which is showing up harrisome-
