General The Corn Crop.
WASHINGTON, 20.—The Postmas-
ter General shows an earnestness in
his proceedings against the con-
tractions who fail in their obliga-
tions. He, yesterday, confiscated
to the use of the government three
certified checks, amounting to
\$1,300 deposited according to law
by Matthew Draper, a failing con-
tractor, accompanying his bill on
the 30th inst. This is the first in-
stance in which the department
has confiscated such checks. The
Postmaster General has also com-
menced suits against the bondsmen
of over forty failing mail contrac-
tors.
The July returns to the Depart-
ment of Agriculture show that the
average in corn is about eight per
cent. greater than last year.
Fisher Still Working.
District Attorney Fisher had
an interview, this p.m., with the
Attorney General, his object being
to give satisfactory replies to the
complaints which have been made
against his administration of the
office of district attorney; no con-
clusions were reached; the inter-
view will take place to-morrow
when the District Attorney Gen-
eral and the Attorney General will
discuss the subject of the resigna-
tion of the District Attorney Gen-
eral, and the request for his resig-
nation will be presented to the
Attorney General, in order that the
accused may have a full hearing.

FOREIGN.
GREAT BRITAIN.
Grand Freemasons' Council.
LONDON, 20.—The council of de-
legates from all the Presbyteries
met in Regent Square, and opened their
session. Many representatives of
American and Canadian churches
were present. The council is to de-
monstrate the unity of belief
among Protestants, arrange mis-
sion and benevolent work, and in-
fluence of the church upon educational
and social reforms.

RUSSIA.
Departure of the American Fleet.
St. PETERSBURG, 20.—The Amer-
ican squadron, which has been
visiting this city, has sailed for
home. Admiral Worden and his
officers were brilliantly received
during their stay. The Czar accom-
panied the Admiral to Cronstadt
on his departure.
FRANCE.
The Tunnel Project, &c.
VERSAILLES, 20.—The Assembly,
after disposing of the budget, will
take up the bill relative to the pro-
posed railway between France and
England. A private bill in re-
ference to the same project has already
passed the British House of Com-
mons and is now before the Lords.
The Assembly has resolved to re-
solve to report in favor of the
project from August 2 to November 10.
SPAIN.
Religious and Military Movements.
SANTANDER, 20.—The recent de-
tention of Protestant books by the
customs authorities here is believed to
be a part of a coercive scheme to
force active Protestants to leave
Spain. This plan, proposed by pro-
minent persons in Madrid, is being
executed here by the clergy and
the civil government. The Assembly
is endeavoring to counteract the
policy by conciliating the Protestants
and moderates with this understand-
ing, while apparently pursuing
a liberal policy regarding
public worship. Military prepara-
tions are being taken in the large
cities against a republican rising.
The Carlists claim that General
Dominguez has reconquered the
whole Carlist army and entered the
Province of Lerida, and that the
Alfonsoists have retreated from
several Carlist divisions in pursuit.
Portuguese Wounded.
An official dispatch is published in
the *Times*, reporting that General
Dominguez has been wounded,
and has taken refuge in France,
near Contereta.

Bad For the Poor, Dear Bread
Likely.
The Bulletin, referring to European
crop indications, says that for the
last three or four weeks, has been
deduced by the weather to the crop
over a very large area of Europe,
covering the most important grain
exporting districts, and the injury
suffered has been sufficient to
modify, very materially, the anti-
cipations of the yield entertained a
month ago; it is this change in the
English and continental markets,
and the result has been seen at
New York in an extraordinary ex-
port of wheat, and an equally ex-
traordinary advance in price.
Public Thieves to be Prosecuted.
NEW ORLEANS, 20.—Gov. Kel-
logg has addressed a letter to the
Attorney General on the closing of
the report by the experts appointed
to examine into the auditor's office,
in which he says that the investi-
gations that have taken place, be-
fore both the civil and criminal
courts, and the investigation and
report of the State examiners, dis-
close gross culpability on the part
of other persons whose acts have
injured the State and for years have
cast discredit on the government.
He says: "I call your at-
tention to the record in this re-
spect, and request that you will im-
mediately take prompt measures to
bring to justice all who have been
guilty of these inquiries."
