EASTERN.

Accepted Office.

WASHINGTON, 4.—Augustus S.
Gaylord, of Saginaw, Mich., has
been tendered, to-day, accepted
of his appointment as assistant
Attorney General for the Interior
Department, vice Wm. H. Smith,
resigned. Mr. Gaylord is a lawyer
of extensive practice, but has not
heretofore been in public life.

True Bills Found.

In addition to the indictment
against Julius Wilkowitz, charged
with fraudulently obtaining
\$20,000 from the government, true
bills have been found by the grand
jury in an alleged conspiracy in
presenting false claims, against
General J. S. Negley, Henry Fet-
ter, Edward J. Leary, and
Peck, George Keaton, Albert Met-
calf, R. C. Mitchell, G. A. Purdy,
and Henry Watson, and also against
Sugg Fort and ex-Congressman R.
R. Butler of Tenn.

Three Children Burned to Death.

WASHINGTON, 5.—A fire occurred
in an alley between 16th and 17th
and I and M streets, this a.m., at
one o'clock, destroying two frame
sheds, and three colored children,
aged ten, twelve, and fifteen years.

A Railway Sold.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., 4.—The eastern
division of the St. Joe and Denver
Railway was sold to-day, at a mar-
shal's sale, by a master in chancery;
it was purchased by the purchasing
committee appointed by the bond-
holders for \$100,000; the western
division will be sold to-morrow.

An arrangement has been perfected
among all parties interested, and
a new company has been organized
to be called the St. Joseph and Pa-
cific Railway Company. A company
as the sale is confirmed the road
will be completed at once, and con-
tinued under the same manage-
ment as now.

Compliment to Senator Booth.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., 4.—Senator
Newton Booth, of Cal., was wel-
comed by his old friends to-day at
Salem, Ind., his native place, but
he declined a public reception.

More Crooked Whiskey Indictments.

ST. LOUIS, 4.—Wm. McKee and
Cot were before the U. S. Dis-
trict Court to-day and gave
bonds, the former in \$5,000, the latter
in \$10,000, to answer indict-
ments against them for conspiring
to defraud the government in con-
nection with crooked whiskey. In-
dictments against several others
were returned to the Court to-day,
but the names have not yet colli-
ally transpired.

Pleads Guilty—Jailed.

Richard B. Jones, late U. S.
storekeeper, withdrew the plea of
not guilty to his indictment and
entered a plea of guilty.

Disparages Jefferson City

City that Col. J. A. Joyce, who has
been in charge of a deputy U. S.
marshal since his conviction some
days ago of conspiracy to defraud
the government, was placed in jail
to-day, to await the action of the
court on a motion for a new trial.

Memorial to Congress.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., 4.—A mem-
orial to Congress, asking the es-
tablishment of a territorial govern-
ment in the Indian country, passed
the House to-day.

Democratic Majority.

ALBANY, N.Y., 4.—The Evening
Journal says:

"Our table, to-day, makes the
state democratic by a majority of
between 8,000 and 9,000. The
Senate will stand 22 republicans
to 10 democrats; more than two-
thirds of the majority; the assembly
72 republicans and 56 democrats,
a republican majority of 16. We
have special advice from almost
every district."

Keynote.

NEW YORK, 4.—The usual throng
filled the Brooklyn rink this evening,
and hundreds were unable to
get in. After singing by Sankey
Mr. Moody preached an eloquent
sermon, his text was "Seek the Lord
while he is near." In the 58th
chapter of Isaiah, he quoted the
audience for want of earnestness,
and said that he had grown tired of
the "holiness" of the "holiness"
bible. He gave many examples
of what men could do by being
terribly earnest. He closed his
sermon with an account of a con-
fession of a young wife in New-
castle, England, who at first said
she didn't want to be a Christian;
she attended the meetings a week,
and then she was led to be a
Christian, and she was saved. He read a
letter from her husband, telling him
that she had since died, and that she
had devoted the last days of her
life to Jesus' work. "When I read
that letter," said Mr. Moody, "I
thanked God that I had gone to
England." After singing and the
closing prayer for congregation
dissolved. Equity meetings were
held in the Simpson M. E. Church.

THE TERRITORIAL QUESTION.

SAN FRANCISCO, 4.—A petition
is being circulated in San Bernardino,
San Diego and Los Angeles coun-
ties, addressed to Senator Sargent,
asking that he should introduce a
bill to annul the Indian question and
the purchase of reservation lands. D. A.
Dryden, Indian agent, has returned
to Los Angeles from the Indian
country, and he reports that there
are no eligible government lands
which the Indians can be placed,
and he recommends the purchase
of a ranch for them. On his re-
turn he found a dispatch from
Indian Affairs, granting the request for
authority to expend \$50,000 for the
immediate necessities of the In-
dians, and expressing a hope to
shortly make arrangements for
leasing a ranch, subject to pur-
chase when funds are appropriated.

CANADA.

Injunction Granted.

MONTREAL, 4.—To-day Judge
Mackay caused a writ of injunc-
tion to be issued, preventing the
board of managers of the tempo-
rary fund of the Presbyterian
Church in Canada, in connection
with the Church of Scotland, from
transferring the property of the
Presbyterian Church of Canada;
the writ was issued on the petition
of the Rev. Gavin Lang and other
non-unionists, who maintain that
the fund, amounting to over four
hundred and fifty thousand, is the
property of the Church of Scot-
land and can't go to the newly-
formed church.

FOREIGN.

SPAIN.

MADRID, 4.—There is no founda-
tion for the statement that Spain
has ordered the equipment of five
men-of-war for Cuban waters.

Preparing to Attack Carlists.

DON SEBASTIAN, 4.—The Carlist
batteries are silent. General Trilla
is concentrating his army at the
Carlists who are besieging Hernani.

AUSTRIA.

Will Proclaim a National Govern-
ment.

VIENNA, 4.—The New Free
Press states that the Herzogovinan
insurgents have recently re-
ceived a thousand breach-loading
rifles from Montenegro. The way-
wardes or military commanders of
Bosnia and Herzegovina have con-
voked an assembly for the purpose
of proclaiming a national govern-
ment.

FRANCE.

Meeting of the Assembly.

PARIS, 4.—One of the first acts
of the Assembly, which took place
this morning, was the unanimous
adoption of M.
Buffet's motion to consider the
electoral bill on Monday. The
motion to raise the state of siege
was not discussed, between the sec-
ond and third reading of the elec-
toral bill.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Looking After Forster.

LONDON, 4.—A special from Ber-
lin says that Prussia has asked
Austria to prevent Bishop Forster,
while residing in the Austrian
part of the empire, from exercising
episcopal functions touching the
Prussian portion of it.

Will Not Act Independently.

A Berlin special says—"It is af-
firmed that Russia is not desirous
of acting independently in the
Herzegovinian matter. The three
powers continue in complete har-
mony."

Withdrawn.

The Emperor's state that the
Admiralty's fugitive slave circular
will be withdrawn and new instructions
issued.

PRUSSIA.

Commercial Treaty Ratified.

BERLIN, 4.—Parliament has rat-
ified a treaty of commerce with the
republic of Costa Rica. Herr Von
Delbrück stated in Parliament that
the government intends sending
representatives to Central America,
for the purpose of extending treaty
relations.

WHEN AN INDIAN CLAIM MAY
BE PAID.—The Attorney General
has written the following letter to
the Assistant Secretary of the In-
terior in regard to the claim of cer-
tain parties for moneys out of the
Osage fund, that claim having been
brought against the fund on ac-
count of services rendered to the
tribe by the claimants.

Department of Justice,
Washington, D. C.,
October 29, 1875.

The Hon. B. R. Cowan, Assistant
Secretary Interior.

Sir—I reply to yours of the 28th
last, relating to the claim of Adair
and Vann for some \$230,000 upon the
Osage Indian fund, upon which
claim \$50,000 has already been
paid. I have the honor to say that
the claim is not valid, and is
and are under the protection of the
government. The claim is for as-
sistance in the Osage Indians. If the
President certifies that in his op-
inion, the contracts were made in
good faith, were fair and reasonable
and in equity and justice, the same
on the facts presented to the Pres-
ident, then, as matters of law the
Secretary will be justified in mak-
ing the payment demanded.
