

ser offices of the Priesthood when they were called to act in them, and in every way set such an example before their children that their faith in the gospel may become strengthened, and that they may be prepared for future usefulness.

The Saints should honor the Priesthood and the Priesthood should magnify their callings, setting the people over whom they preside a worthy example. He urged upon the Saints to be prompt in paying their tithing; let mothers instruct the children to put by carefully the tithing due from the dairy, the henry, etc., and thus beget in them faith in this law that was to be continued for ever, and they will grow up having confidence in the revelations given in the last days; and if we desire to be honored in our future generations we must lay the foundations with our children.

After singing, prayer was offered, by Elder Brigham Young.

After the opening services, President Joseph E. Taylor presented the members of the High Council, the clerk of the Stake and High Council and the home missionaries. There were unanimously sustained as at the last conference, with the exception that the name of Elder Benjamin F. Cummings, Sr., was omitted as a home missionary, he being on a mission to the States. Elder Orson Pratt delivered a short but powerful address, on the negligence of the saints of this Stake in attending meetings, while in other stakes their largest meeting house will not hold the people, on such occasions. He urged the saints to wake up to a sense of their duty for the Lord had commanded his saints to meet together, and the priesthood should instruct the saints in their duties and set them a worthy example, or the displeasure of the Almighty would be kindled against this people.

The following brethren bore testimony to the truth of the work of the Lord, and exhorted the Saints to faithfulness: Bishop James Crane, Bishop Solomon J. Despain, Bishop Andrew Burt, and Elders Soren Jensen, Theodore Braendli and M. M. Steele, the three latter being returned missionaries, who related their experience abroad.

Elder Wilford Woodruff addressed the conference, bearing testimony to the remarks of Bro. Pratt. He felt that, if this people did not repent, the judgments of the Lord were at our door. Both the living and the dead were looking to us to do a work for them and if we neglected our duties their blood would be answered upon our heads.

President Angus M. Cannon read a report from the superintendent of the Temple Quarry, of the amount of work done by the wards of this Stake in that place. He also read a notice from the Tabernacle Committee, stating that they were using a great deal of tire-iron and round iron in the Stake Tabernacle, and requesting those who had iron of the above description that they could spare, to donate the same for that work.

Conference adjourned till 10 a.m. on Sunday, July 7th.

After singing, prayer was offered by Elder Elias Morris.

Sunday, July 7th, 10 a.m.

After the opening exercises, Elder George Q. Cannon addressed the Conference. He appreciated these meetings very much, more particularly perhaps from the fact that he so seldom had an opportunity of meeting with the Saints. He related his experience at Washington. This people were becoming better understood every day, and those who understood them and had visited among them, though they might not agree with their religious views, were their warmest friends. The necessity for Utah being admitted as a State was beginning to be felt by thinking minds of the nation. But whether we were admitted or not, he regarded as of very little importance, for the Lord would overrule all things for the good of his people, if they were faithful. He felt more and more impressed with the wisdom of God, in selecting this place for the gathering of his people, when witnessing the uncertainty, fear and want that existed elsewhere, even in places where they seemed to have more natural advantages than we. Since the death of the late President B. Young people had begun to regard

this people in a more favorable light, for the impression existed that Mormonism would cease with Brigham Young; but, when they found that the work did not depend upon one man, they were disappointed and began to realize to some extent, the true position of the people of this Territory. Many were willing to confess that even the practice of polygamy was preferable to the state of society existing in the world.

Elder Joseph F. Smith delivered a powerful discourse upon the doctrine of celestial marriage.

Conference adjourned till 2 p.m.

After singing by the choir, prayer was offered by Elder Levi W. Hancock.

2 p.m.

Opening exercises. Elder Brigham Young felt that the speakers during this conference had been actuated by the spirit of God. One of the greatest testimonies there was of the truth of this work was the fact that the people of every land when they embraced it were actuated by the same spirit as we are, and were united with the Saints of these valleys in sustaining the priesthood.

He warned the Saints to avoid the evils indulged in by the Jaredites and Nephites. Their destruction was the effect of a gradual departure from the principles of the gospel, and if we were preserved it would be because we were more faithful than they. He concluded with an urgent exhortation to parents to look after the welfare of their children, that they depart not from the ways of the Lord, but assist in bearing off the work which they had spent their lives for. If the people of this Stake would set the saints of other Stakes a proper example the work would roll on with tenfold rapidity, and the Elders abroad feel its influence and be much more effective in their labors. Many seemed to think that the United Order was a failure, but this was a mistake; for the center stake of Zion could never be built up on any other principle.

President John Taylor delivered a discourse upon the duties of the priesthood and the Saints generally. He spoke with great power upon the coldness and neglect of duty manifested on the part of many of the brethren. These he urged to a thorough awakening and repentance, stating that unless they changed for the better they would incur the sore displeasure of God. He gave many valuable instructions, concerning which an adequate idea could not be conveyed in a brief synopsis.

Elder Orson Pratt followed, in the same strain, speaking with great earnestness and force.

The name of Elder John Nicholson was presented to the Conference by Elder George Q. Cannon, he having been called to go on a mission to Europe. The vote to sustain him on his mission was unanimous.

Conference adjourned to October 5th, 1878, at 10 a.m., at the Large Tabernacle.

An anthem was sung by the choir.
