FOR MANUAL TRAINING.



MOOD IN MUSIC.

Inter-sting Exposition by Frof Stephens at L D. S. Un versity Today.

At the Latter-day Saints' University this morning, Prof. Stephens spoke before the student assembly on mood in music, and gave illustrations of the national melodies of Norway, Wales, and the negro melodies that are likely to be folk-songs of the future. The songs of Norway were first mentioned. Some of the Norwegian national airs, the speak-er stated, have the plaintive strains of mesickness, due perhaps to the lone-life which the herdsmen live on the hills. Some **f** these are girls who tend the stock and the peculiar longing ideas which the music suggests, may be due to this environment. On the other hand, the patriotic airs, which the university students sing in great choruses, are stirring and triumphant in quality. An example of each class of song was re-

example of each class of song was re-presented by the Professor, to the de-light of the students. The music of Wales, the speaker said, is justly celebrated both for its an-tiquity and for its intrincic qualities. The war song of the Britons is one of the most ancient. The Welsh national anthem was then illustrated by the speaker with Dr. Parry's addition to it. Also a love song from the same source.
