

council at the residence of Lord Granville, foreign secretary. Lord Derby, Secretary of Colonies, and Sir Charles Dilke, president of the local government board, were also present. This was the first cabinet council attended by them since their appointment.

The meeting lasted three hours. Extra precautions were taken to ensure the safety of members of the cabinet attending the council, and two Irish detectives followed Earl Spencer as an escort to Granville's residence.

Two convict prison wardens today brought a convict to the treasury. Evidence of the most important nature was obtained at the inquiry. The convict is believed to be Walsh, a Clerkenwell Fenian.

Three thousand pounds, the balance of the Duchess of Marlborough's relief fund, will be devoted to the assistance of Irish emigration.

A steamer of about 1,500 tons burdened off the coast last Friday. It was impossible to render assistance.

Dublin, 6.—The Queen's Bench division granted warrants for the arrest of Davitt, Healy and Quinn.

The grand jury returned a true bill for seditious libel against Wm. O'Brien, editor of the *United Ireland*; also, a true bill against Downing, for the murder of policeman Cox.

If a desirable and safe candidate for Parliament can be found for Cork, it is likely Parnell will resign Cork and contest Dublin County. Edward Cecil Guinness will be the conservative candidate.

Paris, 6.—Prince Krapotkin is ill, and removed to the infirmary. He is suffering with congestion of the brain.

Prince Jerome denies that he aspires to the French dynasty by divine right.

The *National* says: Whatever the vote is in the Senate on the expulsion bill, the Minister of War will request of the President a decree placing the Orleans Princes in the army on the retired list.

Fallieres left his bed today for an hour. A week's repose is absolutely necessary for his recovery; hence he will not be present at expulsion bill debate.

Crowds visited the Hotel Drouot today, to inspect Sara Bernhardt's jewels offered for sale.

Berlin, 6.—A small packet was sent. Keyeser, Supreme Court Councillor. On opening it a slight explosion occurred. Examination showed it contained an infernal machine. Keyeser subsequently received an anonymous letter threatening him for his severity in examining law students.

The Emperor of China has telegraphed congratulation to the Crown Prince on the occasion of his silver wedding; the first telegram from the Emperor of China to a European Prince.

Prince Sergius Onoussoff, privy Councillor and Secretary of State, is dead.

Madrid, 6.—The government has ordered the adoption throughout the country of the decimal metric system of weights and measures.

The anti-slavery society will shortly demand the extinction of the Cuban system, which compels former slaves to continue in the service of their masters for a term of years.

Another earthquake at Archena lasted five minutes; no damage.

Nice, 6.—Northcote has left for London. The Prince of Wales and Salisbury follow Friday, and Gladstone later.

At Cornwell, Bigelow, an American, won the first prize for the carriage most tastefully decorated with flowers.

St. Petersburg, 6.—The government has granted the Finnish Senate the power to establish literary, scientific and economical societies, grant permits for tramways, reduce the customs tariff and sell land to foreigners.

The city has resumed its normal appearance, the palace is open to guests, and the programme of the Czar's movements is announced for the next three months.

London, 6.—The *Times*, commenting on the Emperor of Russia's coronation manifesto, says: Much too little attention is attracted by the subsidence of the revolutionary storm and the reassertion of the ascendancy by the permanent forces of Russian society. The events of the last few weeks indicate a break up, at any rate for the present, of a wicked and sterile conspiracy.

Berlin, 7.—Referring to the discussion in France on General Thebaudine's conduct at Metz, the *Kreuzzeitung* says: Government is right

in deeming it a matter for the French people and army to consider whether they are willing to accept as the highest representative of the army a General who has broken his word of honor.

St. Petersburg, 7.—The Czar's manifesto in relation to his coronation says: We determined in our own heart not to perform this sacred right until the feelings excited by the crime to which the benefactor of his people fell a victim, had time to calm.

Vienna, 7.—A number of legitimate nobles are expected to visit the Count de Chambord at his residence at Goritz.

London, 7.—The *Times* says: The assembling of the conference here on the Danubian question has been delayed in consequence of the non-arrivals of the delegates of some of the powers.

Dublin, 7.—The *Dublin Gazette* officially says: The agrarian outrages in Ireland during the month of January numbered ninety.

London, 7.—A bottle has been found on Bournemouth Beach, containing a saloon ticket on which are written the following words: "Our ship is in great distress; masts destroyed, immediate help necessary; steamer *Nederland*."

The Red Star Line steamer *Nederland*, Capt. Weberweg, sailed from Antwerp, Feb. 3d, for New York. Bournemouth Beach, where the bottle is said to have been found, is in Southampton County, England.

It is reported the steamer *Kenmur Castle*, 2,000 tons, London to Shanghai via Suez Canal, is lost; passengers saved, but many of the crew drowned.

The report of the loss of the steamer *Kenmur Castle* has been confirmed. She foundered in the Bay of Biscay on the 2d, in a few minutes. She was only able to launch one boat, containing all the passengers numbering eight, and eight of the crew. The crew numbered 40 persons. The survivors when rescued by the French steamer, only wore night dresses and were all very weak.

A Paris dispatch states Fallieres, President of the Council today expressed his intention to resign.

A heavy gale prevails on the coast; several minor casualties involving loss of life are reported.

The British imports in January increased over January of last year £3,717,500; exports increased the same period £778,000.

The captain, first mate and thirty of the crew of the *Asiatic* are drowned.

Germany continues excited over the elevation of Gen. Thebaudin to the ministry. The *Post* says: The incident will possibly prove a source of fresh calamities for France and Germany, and a misfortune to the countries likewise.

Berlin, 7.—The Prussian provinces of Saxony, Hesse and Nassau have been designated for great military manoeuvres under the personal direction of Emperor William. Five weeks will be devoted to siege operations at Grandence.

The Emperor is especially gratified at the acceptance by the Prince of Wales of the colonelcy of Bulche's Hussars. He announced the appointment in a very touching autograph letter to the Prince. A deputation of the regiment request permission to tender personally to Wales an expression of their sense of the honor conferred, and hope he will attend the spring and autumn parade and present the regiment to the Emperor.

The Liberal and Ultramontane protest against holding sessions of the Landtag and Reichstag simultaneously.

A treaty of commerce with Mexico grants Germany noteworthy advantages.

Paris, 7.—Jules Ferry yesterday recommended that President Grevy expel the Orleans Princes by decree. Grevy hesitates to take such a course, but it will probably be adopted by the Ministry. Sweeping changes in the Ministry, making virtually a new Cabinet, are expected to be gazetted on Sunday night. It is even said that General Thebaudin, Minister of War, will be the only member of the present Ministry remaining. Legrand, former Minister of Marine, is mentioned for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Daves and Thebaudin before the Senate committee advocated the expulsion bill. The committee will draft a report demanding the rejection of the bill.

The feeling of uneasiness continues. Business is stagnant. The public are yearning for a strong government.

Melbourne, 7.—Returns of elec

tions for members for Territorial Parliament foreshadow the defeat of the Government.

City of Mexico, 7.—John G. Buchan Hepburn, son of Sir Thomas Buchan Hepburn, English Baronet, was murdered by miners on Sunday, in Pinos Altos, Chihuahua. Five of the murderers were tried and shot Monday.

Hamburg, 7.—The case against the captain of the *Sultana*, which ran into and sank the *Cimbria*, will be brought to trial on Saturday; 68 witnesses from the *Sultana* and *Cimbria* will be examined. It is rumored a prosecution for manslaughter is intended.

Cairo, 7.—It is reported here the Egyptians in Sudan have yielded to the false Prophet.

Vienna, 8.—Prince Henry VII, of Rus, German ambassador of this court, had a long interview with Herr Fija, President of the Hungarian Council, who directly afterwards drove to the residence of Count Kalnoky, Imperial Austro-Hungarian minister of foreign affairs, where he stayed several hours. The Hungarian minister of finance opposes the construction of the strategic railroads on account of the expense. At a recent meeting of the Austrian and Hungarian cabinets it was, decided, however, that such a railroad was necessary.
