Local and Other Matters.

Returned from the Coast.—Yesterday Paul A. Schettler, Esq., City Treasurer, returned from San Francisco, in time to spend the holidays at home. During his sojourn on the coast he has been under treatment for his health at the establishment of Dr. Munro, and comes back much improved.

Burglary.—Yesterday afternoon the house of Mr. Thomas Fawcett, First Ward, was broken into by a burglar, who entered by one of the windows during the absence of Mrs. Fawcett. Interest to be Paid.
WASHINGTON, 24.—The Secretary of the Treasury has directed the payment of the January interest to be commended on Monday next, with interest.

The Commissioner of the General Land Office, to-day, ordered a patent to be issued for the town site of Central City, Colorado, with the following proviso: "Provided, that no title shall be hereby acquired to any mine of gold, silver, cinnabar or copper, or to any valid mining claim or possession, based on existing laws, and the grant hereby made is declared to be subject to all the conditions, limitations and restrictions contained in section 2826 of the revised statutes, so far as the same are applicable thereto."

General Jno. A. Dix, of N. Y., and others representing mineral claims, have been protesting against any patent issuing for this town site, unless the department should make an exception, and have covered the ground with a net of lawyers, and a width of 100 feet of surface ground. Commissioner Burdett, in a wise argument, accompanied by his order of to-day, shows that the proviso above quoted, is not a condition, but a grant, and conditions that can be made under the existing law. The decision is of great importance to the large mining interests in many sections of this State.

Fire.—A fire, at Red Oak, Iowa, yesterday, destroyed eleven buildings, valued at \$85,000, partly insured.

A Washington special says that information has been filed with the authorities here that Spanish agents have violated the neutrality laws by enlisting Italians in New York, for service in Spanish regiments in Cuba. The matter is to be examined. It seems to be a similar affair to that which led to the English enlistment of John Chapman, receiving his passport under President Pierce's cover.

A St. Paul special says that seventy-three resolutions, purporting to be adopted by the meeting of the Catholics of the St. Paul, are being circulated, and are being used to witness the consecration of the city.

In the evening, at the same spectacle will be presented for the decoration of the elder people. Miss Jean Clara Walters as "Cherry."

Post Office Closed.—The Post office will be closed to-day, excepting from noon till one o'clock.

Earthquake Shocks.—RICHMOND, Va., 23.—Shocks of earthquake last night were felt along the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway as far as Staunton, 140 miles northwest of Richmond; also along the line of the Richmond and Danville Railroad to the southern border of the State. No damage is reported.

An Ice Storm.—PORT JERVIS, N. Y., 23.—The recent mild weather has had the effect of raising the Delaware River sufficiently to try to ice the ice; a gorge formed at Narrowsburgh this afternoon, damming the water, which is rising rapidly. This is one of the places where an ice storm formed last winter, which resulted so disastrously.

Militia Inspection.—HARRISBURG, Pa., 23.—An order issued by Adjutant General Latta, announcing that the general inspection of the militia of this State will take place during the months of April and May next.

Western.—SAN FRANCISCO, 23.—A dispatch from Tucson confirms the previous report as to the movements of the revolutionists and State troops of Sonora. A portion of Pesqueira's forces have entered Arizona. General Kautz, this afternoon, telegraphed that he has been ordered to compel Serna to surrender, and he had ordered three companies of cavalry to the camp. General Kautz carried out the order. Governor Sanford will leave immediately for the Sonora line.

In Possession of the Revolutionists.—A dispatch from San Diego says that a courier had arrived from the capital of Lower California, reporting that the revolutionists had attacked the place and killed Governor Villagrana and twenty-nine others, and had possession of everything; the report needs confirmation, but is considered highly probable by those familiar with affairs in that country.

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

A Correction.—LONDON, 23.—The Gordon elected to Parliament yesterday was Sir Gordon GORDON, and not Lord Advocate Gordon, for the Glasgow and Aberdeen Universities.

Victory by Russians.—Wales in Calcutta.—The Invincible Russia states that emissaries from Khokand had incited the tribes subject to Russia in the neighborhood of Uspatke, Tashkent, to revolt. The Russian troops attacked them, and were at first repulsed, but subsequently obtained a victory. Three hundred rebels were killed, and the remainder fled. The insurrection is now suspended.

The Prince of Wales landed at Calcutta to-day, and had a magnificent reception.

EGYPT.

Negotiations with the Sultan.

CAIRO, 23.—It is rumored that the Khedive is negotiating for the sale of Egypt's founder shares in the Suez Canal to the British Government, and that the British Government is considering the offer.

Prussia.—BERLIN, 23.—It is stated that the principal feature of the great power conference, which is to be held in Berlin, is that the powers are to be permitted to interfere if necessary for the common interest, and that Turkey is considered as needing the tutelage of Europe.

TO-DAY'S DISPATCHES.

EASTERN.

Penitentiary for Ten Years.

CLEVELAND, O., 24.—Patrick Kanen, who was convicted of manslaughter, for starving his idiot son to death, has been sentenced to the penitentiary for ten years.

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It is a violation of the spirit of the first constitutional amendment. The resolutions further condemn a policy which would stifle discussion by minority by appeals to religious and patriotic emotions, and declare complete agreement with the views expressed in the Danforth letter before the Arizona Legislature, February 20, 1875.

\$50,000 Fire.—GENEVA, N. Y., 24.—The White Springs farm buildings and mansion, owned by James O. Sheldon, were burned last night, loss \$50,000, insurance \$25,000.

\$12,000 Fire.—DETROIT, 24.—The Grand Trunk depot building at the Milwaukee Junction, and the Exchange Hotel adjoining, were burned this a. m.; loss \$12,000, partly insured.

A Thief Lodged in Jail.—MEMPHIS, Tenn., 24.—Sheriff Anderson arrived last night from San Francisco, with A. Woodward in charge, who lodged him in jail. He, some two years ago, was county trustee, and absconded, leaving a deficit of about \$160,000, and was arrested here for the embezzlement, and he will make it warm for them when the proper time comes, as thus far he is the only one that has suffered.

Guests Arrive.—NEW YORK, 24.—The jury in the Bowen libel suit are still out, being unable to agree on the question of damages.

Bank statement.—Loans decrease \$1,829,000; specie increase \$254,100; legal tenders decrease \$1,198,300; deposits decrease \$3,590,200; circulation decrease \$77,900; reserve increase \$254,000.

Egyptians Harassed by Abyssinians.—The Weiser Zeitung, of Bremen, Dec. 8th, contains the following account of the capture and massacre of a detachment of Egyptian troops by Abyssinians, which reported some time ago by cable.

"We have had news from Abyssinia. An expedition of about two thousand men, sent by the Khedive under the command of Arendop, a Dane, to subjugate the Abyssinians, was drawn into ambush and nearly every man slaughtered. General Arendop was killed. A mean officer in the Egyptian service, including Col. Stone."

Arranged with Creditors.—Henry Clewes & Co., bankers, have arranged with their creditors, and have obtained a full discharge.

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Montenegro Preparing, &c.

LONDON, 24.—A Berlin dispatch to the Times says that the Prince of Montenegro has concluded negotiations for a loan of a million dollars, which the Slavonians believe is guaranteed by Russia; it is also reported that an American agent, George H. Morgan, has been sent to the Prince with a canon, and rifles. The Montenegro official journal publishes an article warmly praising the insurgents in Herzegovina. The Times correspondent remarks that the only explanation of the attitude of Montenegro is that the Government has been led to believe that it will shortly be allowed to interfere.

A telegram from Vienna to the Times states that the note of the Northern powers, containing proposals for reforms in Turkey, is about to be sent to the governments of France, Great Britain and Italy, with an invitation to join in their support.

The Times, in a leading article, says: "We are prepared to urge that the clause of the treaty of Paris forbidding intervention between the Sultan and his subjects be rescinded, that the powers may be permitted to interfere if necessary for the common interest, and that Turkey be considered as needing the tutelage of Europe."

Taken Kipling.—A Times special from Ponnag, to-day, says that General Colborne reports that he has taken Kintah, without loss; Maharajahs Ismail and Lala fled Ponnag.
