In accordance with your request, and as a token of sincere gratitude, I improve the opportunity with pleasure to inform you of the invaluable merits of the small-pox remedy you sent me several weeks ago.

Here is the remedy spoken of by our correspondent. Often printed in these columns, hundreds will now see it for the first time, so we even give it again:

"Sulphate of zinc, one grain; foxglove (digitalis) one grain; half a teaspoonful of sugar when it is thoroughly mixed, add four ounces of water. Take a teaspoonful every hour. Either disease will disappear in twelve hours. For a child, smaller doses, according to age."

The words "either disease" refer to the context in the original where it says the above recipe will not only cure small-pox but scarlet fever.—Hartford Times.

Deceased was born at Gale, Yorkshire, England, March 3, 1824; and in Nov. 1842, while living with his uncle James Burton, of Bradford, he heard and received the gospel, and in 1843 was ordained to the office of a Priest and soon after to the office of an Elder, and was appointed to preside over the Stanley Branch of the Bradford Conference, England; which position he filled faithfully until 1849, walking eight miles every Sabbath, rain or shine, excepting times of a General Conference, to attend the meetings of his branch.

In 1849 he emigrated to St. Louis to pioneer the way for his wife and two sons, and in nine months' time earned and forwarded means for his family to follow him.

In 1852 he emigrated to Utah, settled in Kayville, where he resided until the Spring of 1856, when he removed to Ogden, where he has lived up to the time of his death.—Com.—Ogden Junction.
