## MORGAN STAKE CONFERENCE.

Feb. 14 and 15. Present on the stand the Presidency of the Stake, President F.M. Lyman of Tooele Stake, High Council, Bishops and others.

Saturday, 10 a.m. After the usual opening exercises President W. G. Smith made a few remarks concerning our temporal interests; thought that the men having the most information and best experience, should be brought forward to operate in guiding the various branches of industry. Made some excellent suggestions in that regard.

Elder Geo. W. Taggart spoke on the same subject, and thought the Saints could make a heaven anywhere by united contentment and earnest action; we were wasting much time by not acting in concert.

Elder Isaac Bowman thought mass meeting in the election of officers. agriculture was the foundation of all industries, and that great attention should be paid to gaining a thorough knowledge of it; whatever we do, we should do well.

Bishop Dixon said his religion taught him the necessity of being united, and of every man understanding, and acting in, his proper position. Reviewed the feelings and acts which led to apostacy, and advised the Saints to avoid them.

Saturday, 2 p. m. After singing and prayer, some of the Bishops gave in their reports, most of which were very favorable.

President Smith spoke at some length on the subject of Primary Associations, encouraged the saints to support those and all other institu tions pertaining to God's kingdom urged upon the people the necessity of being punctual in tithe paying, no matter what source their income was derived from, nor how small their increase.

Elder F. M. Lyman addressed the congregation on the motive God had in view in introducing the various institutions, offices and duties connected with his kingdom. The salvation of man, was the glory of God. We should pay a liberal tithing of the choicest of our productions; bring in our offerings not of the coarsest alone, but of the delicacies as well, that the poor might be comforted; assist each other in acquiring self-control, by patience and love; our pay would be the blessing of God on earth, and eternal life in his celestial kingdom.

Sunday, 10 a. m. After opening ceremonies, the clerk read the quarterly statistical report, also Elder T. R. G. Welch, the tithing clerk, the Stake tithing report for 1879, and the remaining Bishops' reports were given in.

Prest. Samuel Francis spoke on prayer and the form laid down by Jesus Christ. The introduction of the gospel was for the fulfilling of that form, viz., that the will of God might be done on earth as in heaven. Enumerated many of the covenants man had entered into with his Maker, and the temptations almost endless in number, that arrayed themselves against us to prevent their being preserved inviolate. We should testify to the world of our goodness by our virtues, and not restrict ourselves to written duties alone, but unsolicited, take up any labor that would advance the interests of God's kingdom.

Sunday, 2 p.m. After singing, prayer, and the ad-

ministering of the sacrament, Prest. Lyman occupied a portion of time in exhorting the Saints to sincerity and faithfulness, dwelling powerfully and plainly on the magnitude of our duties. We were all acting for "our Father," as missionaries in some department, and, in our children, were educating future advocates of His laws. We should lay the corner stones of their characters in truth and integrity by the nobility of our home examples. Spoke briefly and to the point apon nearly every duty enjoined upon Latterday Saints.

Prest. Richard Fry spoke of home patronage. We were bound by our covenants to sustain home enterprise and industry. Should concentrate our strength on one object at a time, and not expect institutions to succeed that the people did not support. It was characteristic of a Saint to extend all the blessings possible to the whole human family. We were accountable for the influence we exercised, and measurably responsible for the future conduct and character of our children, formed by patterning after our own. We should be thankful for recurring privileges, and remember that our

own knowledge would either condemn or justify us always.

President W. G. Smith gave some excellent advice of local application, suggested several self protective measures, and advised co-operation, throughout the Stake, and where not practicable in large companies to try it in smaller ones.


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
