THE KAISER'S YACHT

Victor, the Fastest Racing Cutter
Seen in British Waters.

BRITANNIA HAS MET HER MATCH.

Congratulations for Emperor William
and Regret that he cannot
Visit England.

LONDON, June 3.—The Times says:

"Mention's display justifies the opinion that she is far and away the fastest large racing cutter ever seen in British waters. Unquestionably she is a great triumph for her designer; in regard to the speed she attained to what must be a half prepared state, her sail not having had the stretch taken out of them and the new gear naturally worked stiff. Nothing but praise can be given in regard to the appearance of the boat. She is prettily shaped and has no excessive overhangings while her bow is longer and her entrance finer than in any previous big cutter, and she cuts the water very clean, so that it may be seen that there is nothing but beauty in her lines. Her sail plan covers 12,200 square feet. This perhaps eclipses the fast Valkyrie. Yet she showed that she was still strong enough to carry such a load of sail."

"Her main feature is her strength, which is equal to that of Valkyrie's. But perhaps her sail area is equally large. It is unquestionable that neither is a phenomenal vessel in light weather, and as she has been built and is finer than Valkyrie, there is no reason to doubt that she will be as good as well. In a small blow, it is the first time that Britannia has had such an exemplary beating, and she has written dimly in her record book, first place covers 12,200 square feet. This perhaps eclipses the fast Valkyrie. Yet she showed that she was still strong enough to carry such a load of sail."

"Britannia has met her match."
