How much truth there may be in the How much truth there may be in the rumors afloat we know not, but if the Shoshones and Bannocks are coalescing for the purpose of war with other tribes and for committing depredations on the whites, it will be well for all to keep their eyes open, especially the emi-grants en route to California, Oregon and Washington, and the citizens of the northern part of this teritory, who will be greatly in danger in the event those nomads become hostile, which is more than probable, and very possible.
