as it Finally Passed:

Following is the full text of the general appropriation bill as it passed the Legislature and was approved by the Governor:

SECTION 1. That the following sum of money be levied upon the State of Utah, for the payment of the expenses of the Legislature, and for other purposes, be appropriated for the year ending April 1, 1884:
