Washington, April 20,--- A definite step was taken today toward a solution of the wood pulp and newspaper cost question in the introduction by Speaker Cannon of a resolution for the appointment of a select committee of six members to investigate and obtain all possible information as to the reasons for the increased prices of white

"Whereas, It is alleged by the American Newspaper Publishers' association ther paper manufacturers lers have threatened to advance and c advanced the price of print paper per ton during the last few months;

Whereas, It is claimed and as erted that the price of print paper is in the wise affected by the tariff, that the no wise affected by the tariff, that the increase in the price of recent date has not been excessive and is not the result either of tariff import duty or of any combination or conspiracy in restraint of trade or otherwise, but is the result wholly of the increase of cost of raw materials and the increase in the wages maid for labor and the shortening of

materials and the increase in the wages paid for labor and the shortening of the hours of labor per day; and, "Whereas, On May 1, 1906, judgment was entered in the circuit court for the district of Minnesota, dissolving the General Paper company as a combina-tion in restraint of trade; and, "Whereas, The increase in the price of paper has occurred notwithstanding the dissolution of the said General Pap-per company or paper trust, and the

per company or paper trust, and the department of justice, though appealed to, reports that it has obtained no evi-dence sufficient to justify the institution of legal proceedings, either civil or criminal, against the alleged com-bination of wood pulp or print paper manufacturers; and,

"Whereas, It is stated by the attorney general of the United States that after complaint had been filed with said at-torney general against the so-cailed paper combination or trust, the com-plainant refused to furnish legal proof or rive the names of witnesses having partial reduced to furnish legal proof or give the names of witnesses having personal knowledge of the facts; and, "Whereas, It is alleged that the com-bination of paper manufacturers in the United States has purchased the out-put of all the paper mills in Canada, in excess of the home consumption, which said purchase, it is alleged, is in furtherance of a consultacy in re-

"Resolved, That the speaker shall ap-point a select committee of six mem-bers to investigate and inquire into the suid alleged facts and to obtain all possub alleged facts and to obtain all pos-sible information in regard to the same, to inquire into the elements and con-ditions involved in the production and supply of wood pulp and print paper in so far as the same are or may be af-fected by any combination or conspir-acy to regulate, monopolize or restrain interstate or foreign commerce and acy to regulate, monopolize or restrain interstate or foreign commerce and trade in the manufacture, supply dis-tribution or sale of wood pulp or pa-per of any kind, or any of the articles entering into the same, or any of the products of paper, and in so far as the same may be affected by the import duties upon wood pulp or paper of any kind, and in so far as the same may be affected by the rapid destruc-tion of the forests in the United States and the consequent increase in the and the consequent increase in th price of wood pulp, and also to quire whether the present prices print and other paper are controlled whole or in part by any combination or persons or corporations engaged in commerce among the several states, or with foreign nations, and if so, to inuire into the organization, conduct nethods and practises of such corpora tions or persons

BANK METHODS.

Disposition on Part of Congress to Pass Legislation for Investigation.

Washington, April 20 .- There is a dis-Washington, April 20.—There is a dis-position on the part of the leaders of both political parties in Congress to pass some legislation before adjourn-ment which will provide for an in-vestigation during the recess of meth-ods employed by banks before and dur-ing the financial panic of last fall with a view of determining whether the recent works of the country were in great banks of the country were re sponsible for the currency stringency The vehicle to carry such authority i all probability will be the provision fo the proposed currency commission for whether that commission is provided for in a financial bill or passed as a separate measure. It is not expected that this measure will declare broadly its full purpose, but that it will con-tain a provision giving the commission general power to investigate any mat-ters regarding banking methods.

SUNDAY THEATER CASES.

More Than Two Thousand Dismissed In Kansas City.

Kansas C,tyl April 20 .- More than 2, Kansas C.(yi April 20.--More than 2. 000 cases against theater people, actors, managers and others employed in Kan-sas City playhouses, which were brought as a result of the Sunday observance crusade started by Judge William H. Wallace of the criminal court last Sep-tember, were wiped off the docket of the court this afternoon when I. B. Kimbell processing attorney of Jack-Kimbrell, prosecuting attorney of Jack-son county, made a motion to dismiss them. This move on the part of the state came after Judge Wallace had de-cided to obey the order of the supreme court and had transferred all of the Sunday closing cases to Judge Porter-field's division of the criminal court. All theater cases stared since last Sep-tember and up to the indictments re-turned April 3, are included in the list.

Senate Committee on Naval Affairs Decides Not to Follow President's Recommendation to Build Four.

Washington, April 20.-No change will be made by the senate in the house program providing for the building of two battleships. The senate commit-tee on naval affairs today decided not to follow President Roosevelt's recom-mendation for an appropriation to build four battleships and to leave this item just as it was agreed upon in the house, In regard to coillers, a provision was incorporated requiring that one of those authorized must be built on the Pacific coast, which means that it will be constructed at Mare It will be constructed at Mar that

that it will be constructed at Mare Island navy-yard. A 10 per cent increase in the pay of enlisted men and non-commissioned officers of the navy, and a 20 per cent increase in the pay of officers, making necessary an additional appropriation of \$237,000. was agreed upon. The Lodge amendment for the purchase of three colliers already constructed was adopted and the amount to be paid was fixed at \$600,000 each. A provision was added, however.

A provision was added, however, leaving it to the discretion of the sec-retary of the navy whether the pur-chase shall be made. Another import-ant amendment provides for the estabishment of a naval station and the construction of a dry dock at Pearl harbor, Hawaiian Islands.

MOTOR SPEED IN BELGIUM.

The demand for a reliable and accu-rate speed register has been met by a Belgian inventor, who has devised an apparatus which, in the experimental trials now taking place, gives entire satisfaction. This apparatus consists of a box placed in the forward part of the vehicle, directly in view of the chauffeur, and containing certain ma-chinery that is connected to the axle by a flexible rod that transmits each revolution of the wheel to the regis-tering apparatus.

COLLISION AWFUL AN

Forty-One Persons Killed and Sixty Injured, Wreekage Taking Fire,

Many Bodies Unrecognizable

Melbourne, Australia, April 20 .- Two trains from Ballarat and Bendigo, respectively, collided late last night at Braybook Junction, about eight miles from Melbourne, 41 persons being killed and 60 injured. The Bendigo train, with two heavy engines, crashed into the rear of the Ballarat train. Five cars of the latter train were wrecked. The wreckage took fire and was almost completely consumed. The wreckage took fire and was almost completely consumed. Many of the bodies were unrecogniz-able when recovered. The Bendigo train suffered but little damage, but the two engines were piled up on top of the rear coaches of the other train. Terrible scenes followed, many of the injured being caught in the wreckage and were with difficulty rescued. It was a long time before doctors and nurses arrived on the scene and as a consequence intense suffer-ing prevailed among the injured.

CAKE LEADS.

CAKE LEADS. Portland, Or., April 20.-From the best advices obtainable there will be no important changes in the returns from Friday's primaries. It is evi-dent that H. M. Cake has a lead of about 3,000 votes for United States senator, over C. W. Fulton and that W. R. Ellis is the nominee for Congress in the Second district. The legislature will be in control of state-ment No. 1 forces, which may mean that Gov. George E. Chamberlain, a Democrat, will be sent to the United States senate by a Republican legis-lature, should he obtain more votes in the general election in June than Cake.
