

ATTEMPT TO SOLVE WOODPULP MATTER

Speaker Cannon introduces Resolution for Appointment of Select Committee.

GOES TO RULES COMMITTEE.

Impoverished to Sit "In Washington or Elsewhere" During Session of House and Recess of Congress.

Washington, April 20.—A definite step was taken today toward a solution of the wood pulp and newspaper cost question in the introduction by Speaker Cannon of a resolution for the appointment of a select committee of six members to investigate and obtain all possible information as to the reasons for the increased prices of waste paper, to the end that needed legislation may be enacted.

The resolution, which was referred to the committee, on rules, of which the speaker is chairman, empowers the committee to sit "in Washington or elsewhere" during sessions of the house and the recess of Congress, and confers the usual authority of subcommittee, the action of the committee.

After the various allegations in the American Newspaper Publishers' association regarding the increased cost of paper, and continues:

PUBLISHERS' ALLEGATIONS.

"Whereas, It is alleged by the American Newspaper Publishers' association that the International Paper company and other paper manufacturers and dealers have threatened to advance and advance the price of print paper 2 per cent during the last few months;

"Whereas, It is claimed and asserted that the price of print paper is no wise affected by the tariff, that the increase in the price of recent date has not been excessive and is not the result of tariff import duty or of any combination or conspiracy in restraint of trade or otherwise, but is the result of the increase in the cost of raw materials and the increase in the wages paid for labor and the shortening of the hours of labor per day; and

"Whereas, On May 1, 1906, judgment was entered in the circuit court for the district of Minnesota, dissolving the General Paper company as a combination in restraint of trade; and

"Whereas, The increase in the price of paper has occurred notwithstanding the dissolution of the said General Paper company or paper trust, and the department of justice, though appealed to, reports that it has obtained no evidence sufficient to justify the institution of legal proceedings, either civil or criminal, against the alleged combination of wood pulp or print paper manufacturers; and

"Whereas, It is stated by the attorney general of the United States that after complaint had been filed with said attorney general against the so-called paper combination or trust, the said attorney general refused to furnish legal proof or give the names of witnesses having personal knowledge of the facts; and

"Whereas, It is alleged that the combination of paper manufacturers in the United States has purchased the output of all the paper mills in Canada, in excess of the home consumption, which said purchase, it is alleged, is in furtherance of a conspiracy in restraint of interstate and foreign commerce; and

"Whereas, It is alleged that the great production of wood pulp in the United States is rapidly depleting the forests of this country, that legislation ought to be enacted which will permit and encourage the importation of wood pulp upon more favorable terms, so as to conserve the national forests, and so increase the price, to control the character of the paper manufactured, or to regulate the output of wood pulp or the paper mills in restraint of trade among the several states or with any foreign country, to the end that needed legislation may be enacted. Now, therefore,

THE RESOLUTION.

"Resolved, That the speaker shall appoint a select committee of six members to investigate and inquire into the alleged facts and to obtain all possible information in regard to the same, to inquire into the elements and conditions involved in the production and supply of wood pulp and print paper in so far as the same are or may be affected by any combination or conspiracy to regulate, monopolize or restrain interstate or foreign commerce and trade in the manufacture, supply, distribution or sale of wood pulp or paper of any kind, or any of the articles entering into the same, or any of the products of paper, or so far as the same may be affected by the import duties upon wood pulp or paper of any kind, and in so far as the same may be affected by the rapid destruction of the forests in the United States and the consequent increase in the price of wood pulp, and also to inquire whether the present prices of print and other paper are controlled in whole or in part by any combination of persons or corporations engaged in commerce among the several states, or with foreign nations, and if so, to inquire into the organization, conduct, methods and practices of such corporations or persons.

"Said committee, or any sub-committee thereof, shall be authorized to sit in Washington or elsewhere during the recess of Congress, and shall have power to subpoena and examine witnesses under oath and to send for records, papers and all other evidence that may be necessary to make the investigation and inquiry herein directed to be made full and complete, and that they shall have authority to sign and the clerk to attest subpoenas during the recess of Congress."

FOR RECLAMATION SERVICE.

Washington, April 20.—The agricultural appropriation bill which was reported to the senate today by the committee on agriculture carries a sum not so large as has been voted in previous years—\$11,642,146, an increase of \$13,340 over the amount of the bill as it was passed by the house.

The senate committee recommended an appropriation of \$10,000 for co-operation between the department of agriculture and the department of justice in demonstrating the feasibility of crop production on lands under the latter service. Another item of \$10,000 was recommended for the purpose of securing hardy forage plants from

BANK METHODS.

Disposition on Part of Congress to Pass Legislation for Investigation.

Washington, April 20.—There is a disposition on the part of the leaders of both political parties in Congress to pass some legislation before adjournment which will provide for an investigation during the recess of Congress into the financial panic of last fall with a view of determining whether the great banks of the country were responsible for the currency stringency.

The vehicle to carry such authority in all probability will be the provision for the proposed currency commission which will be authorized to investigate in a financial bill or passed as a separate measure. It is not expected that this measure will declare broadly that the currency stringency was caused in part by any combination of persons or corporations engaged in commerce among the several states, or with foreign nations, and if so, to inquire into the organization, conduct, methods and practices of such corporations or persons.

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BATTLESHIP PROGRAM

Senate Committee on Naval Affairs Decides Not to Follow President's Recommendation to Build Four.

Washington, April 20.—No change will be made by the senate in the house program providing for the building of two battleships and two cruisers.

The senate committee on naval affairs today decided not to follow President Roosevelt's recommendation for an appropriation to build four battleships and to leave this item just as it was agreed upon in the house. In regard to cruisers, a provision was incorporated requiring that one of those authorized must be built on the Pacific coast, which means that it will be constructed at Mare Island navy-yard.

A 10 per cent increase in the pay of enlisted men and non-commissioned officers of the navy, and a 20 per cent increase in the pay of officers, making an additional appropriation of \$337,000, was agreed upon. The Lodge amendment for the purchase of three cruisers already constructed was adopted and the amount to be paid was fixed at \$500,000 each.

A provision was added, however, leaving it to the discretion of the secretary of the navy whether the purchase shall be made through the navy department or through the establishment of a naval station and the construction of a dry dock at Pearl harbor, Hawaiian Islands.

ADMIRAL EVANS IMPROVING STEADILY.

Pasos Robles, Hot Springs, Cal., April 21.—Mrs. Marsh, daughter of Rear Admiral Evans, left the Pasos Robles hot spring at 10:52 last night for Los Angeles to attend the celebrations at that city to meet her brother, Admiral Evans, and Flag Lieut. Train, who preceded her the night before.

P. E. McDonnell is of course remaining with the admiral. He reports that Admiral Evans spent an excellent night and that steady improvement in his condition is being made.

ARBITRATION TREATY SIGNED.

Washington, April 20.—A general arbitration treaty between the United States and Spain was signed today. It covers all disputes between the two countries and will follow the lines of the general arbitration treaties already signed between this and several of the European governments.

MOTOR SPEED IN BELGIUM.

All of the cities and villages of Belgium have endeavored to regulate in a satisfactory way to all concerned the matter of a speed limit within their respective jurisdictions, and ten kilometers (6.2 miles) per hour as a maximum speed. This applies to all roads generally established throughout the entire kingdom.

In cases in which the owners of automobiles and chauffeurs have been apprehended on the charge of exceeding the speed limit it has been extremely difficult to establish accurately the precise rate of speed at which the vehicle was traveling, and for purposes of investigation in case of accident it is often of the utmost importance to know the exact speed at which a vehicle was traveling at the time of the accident.

The demand for a reliable and accurate speed register has been met by a Belgian inventor, who has devised an apparatus which, in the experimental trials now taking place, gives entire satisfaction. The apparatus consists of a box placed in the forward part of the vehicle, directly in view of the chauffeur, and containing certain machinery that is connected to the axle by a flexible rod that transmits each revolution of the wheel to the registering apparatus.

The mechanism is arranged to mark on different rates of speed; that is, fifteen, thirty and sixty kilometers (9.32, 18.63 and 37.26 miles) per hour, indicated respectively by a white, red and blue disk. Thus when the car is running in a town where the speed limit does not exceed ten kilometers, the white disk is the one that should be visible; if running in the country, where the speed limit is thirty or sixty kilometers, then either the red or blue disk should be seen. In this manner the moment a car is near enough to permit of the disk being seen the rate of speed is known, and the driver can be stopped and the rate of speed, as indicated by the disk, can be verified by an examination of the register, which is arranged to indicate by

This perforated band or ribbon may be demanded by the controlling authorities as often as may be deemed advisable, say once every month and any indication of having exceeded the speed limit, which the ribbon would have registered, could be noted.

Other course, the box containing the registering mechanism would be closed and sealed in such a manner that neither the chauffeur nor the owner of the car could open it nor take out the registering ribbon without the intervention of the authorities having control of such matters.—Consular Report.
