PARIS, 25.—Michael Mason, the French dramatic author, is dead.

Berlin, 25.—Two thousand five hundred cabmen struck, to-day, for an increase of wages.

Cincinnati, 24.—Ice an eighth of an inch thick this morning. It is feared the fruit is injured.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

Latest reports from the sections of the Mississippi show about 83 persons were killed and about 30 wounded, many dangerously. Loss unprecedented.

New Orleans, 24.—Marks Brother & Co., commission merchants of this city and Matamoras, have suspended. Liabilities probably \$100,000; available assets believed to be small.

Boston, 24.—By a vote of 55 nays to 100 yeas, the House refused to pass a resolution for amendment of the constitution so women may be appointed justices of the peace and notaries public. A two-thirds vote was necessary.

Atlanta, Ga., 24.—The election for Governor passed quietly; a light vote. No opposition. Harry D. McDaniel, democratic nominee, is elected, and will probably be inaugurated on the 12th of May.

Boston, 24.—John E. White, Congressman from Kentucky, and Alice M., daughter of ex-Congressman Harris, were married at Eastbridge. Their bridal trip includes the Pacific slope.

Knoxville, 24.—W. B. Staley, son of Judge Staley, committed suicide at the residence of a young lady who refused to marry him. It was the second attempt to take his life for the same cause. The deceased was twenty years old, and a lawyer.

New York, 24.—The so-called scandal on the revenue by H. Spiegel & Co., Broad Street, turns out to be purely a technical affair, which occurred through innocent carelessness of employees, in which the firm cannot be directly or indirectly involved.

There were over 300 bids for Indian supplies opened to-day.

St. Louis, 24.—The stockmen in the Texas Pan Handle, at a recent meeting, decided to begin the spring trade round up of cattle in the Canadian and Wichita Rivers and Wolf Creek districts May 10th, and Salt Lake and Red River districts May 15th. If there be any trouble with working cow-boys, it will develop at these round-ups. Lieut. John H. Brown with a company of frontiersmen and a battalion of Texas rangers, is camp near Madeate, in the center of the troubled districts, and will do everything possible to preserve order.

Philadelphia, 24.—Ex-Treasurer Egan, of the Irish Land League, says the dynamite party will have very little following in the convention. Referring to the movement of his mother country, Egan said: "It depends in a large measure on the support of the Irish element in America. So long as the present satisfaction is kept alive by the report of 2,000,000 Irish-Americans in America, all the ingenuity of the English government will be taxed to devise measures to cope with the Irish in America, and Ireland will correspondingly hopeful of ultimate success."

Sacramento, 25.—In the U. S. Circuit Court, to-day, in the case of the United States against Charles Ferguson, charged with counterfeiting, Judge Hoffman decided that during the new five-cent nickel is counterfeiting, and the jury convicted the prisoner.

New Haven, 25.—Wm. Bradley, "the Kid," pugilist, is missing from home at Ansonia since 18th. Foul play is suspected. "Kid" is cousin to Charley McNeill, English champion, now in America.

Annapolis, Md., 25.—Wm. Peck, whipping his wife, was given 20 lashes, the first enforcement of the law for punishing wife beaters in this county.

Jackson, Miss., 25.—Ellza Pinkston, colored, who figured prominently as a witness in 1875 and 1876, and in jail at Canton. She was freed as a pauper.

Chicago, 25.—The Appellate Court decided to-day that a certificate of membership in the Chicago Board of Trade can't be taken possession of by attachment.

Nashville, 25.—In the suit of the United States government against the Chattanooga Railroad, in the Federal Court to-day, Judge Baxter decided that the debt for unpaid coupons amounting to \$153,000 with interest, is barred by the statute of limitations. The jury brought in a verdict for defendants.

Pittsburg, 25.—The convention of railroad coal miners decided to strike May 1st against the reduction of half a cent. About two-thirds of the pits were represented, and a committee was appointed to visit the mines where the men were working for three cents, and endeavor to have them join the strike. If they succeed, work will be suspended in all the pits, and between 7,000 and 8,000 men be out of employment.

Milwaukee, 25.—The Union shops have resolved to grant the cigar makers an advance of \$1 after May 1st, and there will be no strike. These shops, however, embrace all the small factories, to the exclusion of the large concerns, and trouble is feared in such places.
