Baptist Women's Meeting—The ladies of Immanuel Baptist church will meet tomorrow evening in the church to organize for active work.

Rushing Big Dam—Engineer M. S. Darrow is back from Boise, where advantage is being taken of the fine weather to rush work on the dam of the mammoth reservoir.

Dispatcher Moves Office—The office of the dispatcher of the street car is being moved today from the Second East street car barn to a social or shop site on Tenth ward square.

Miners Returning—The coal companies at Rock Springs are steadily securing men to fill the vacancies caused by the departure of idle miners during September. It is expected that the full quota will be on duty again before the end of the month.

Postpone League Organization—On account of the political campaign and the approaching general election, the action on the scheme of organizing the commercial clubs of the state into a league has been postponed until the second week in November.

Printers May Form a Club—Printers from the many offices in the city met last evening at the Commercial club to discuss plans for a social organization. It is expected that a permanent organization will be effected at another meeting.

The selsomograph first recorded the shock at 11 minutes 51 seconds after midnight, the second preliminary tremor being a little over six minutes afterwards, the strong motion developing at 12:24 o'clock.

HEBER M. WELLS TO TAKE ACTION

Former Governor Will Enter Court to Test Validity of Bond Issue.

IT IS NOT A FRIENDLY AFFAIR

Will Apply for Writ of Prohibition in Interests of Taxpayers and Not As a Mere Formality.

To the supreme court of Utah will fall the task of determining whether or not the municipal bonds voted for Salt Lake July 29 just are valid. In the opinion of many persons certain phases of the bonding proposition, before and after the election, tended to invalidate the issue. Acting upon this surmise, application for a writ of prohibition will be instituted in the court indicated, which has original jurisdiction in such matters, that the question may be judicially settled.

The action will be brought by former Gov. Heber M. Wells, manager of the Utah Savings & Trust company, the law firm of Richards, Richards & Perry having been retained in the matter. Certain alleged flaws in the advertisement of the election will be set forth, as for instance, the absence of due notice of the polling places, again it is contended that the advertisement of the bonds provided that they would be redeemed by specified amounts, and the bonds themselves name a different mode of redemption.

The bonds amounting to \$600,000, were purchased by Woodin, Mackay & Co., of Chicago. It is said that the buyers are brokers rather than actual dealers in bonds, and have not been able to turn them over as easily as anticipated.

The action to be instituted by Mr. Wells is not one of mere formality, neither is it intended to be friendly to the bond proposition. It is solely in the interests of the taxpayers that the due status is sought to be determined.

FOR UPLIFT OF CLERKS.

Association Will Hear Address by Miss Emma L. Amphere Tonight.

Miss Emma L. Amphere, field secretary for the Retail Clerks' association, is to speak at labor hall this evening, her theme will be the raising of ethical standards. The Retail Clerks' association claims that a girl requires at least \$4.50 a week to support herself comfortably with merely the necessities of life. Following is an account of a week's expenses, according to the figures of the association: Room rent, \$2; car fare, 60 cents; meals, \$8.50; laundry, 50 cents; clothing, \$2; shoes, 10 cents; minor expenses, 40 cents; total, \$14.50. The association therefore maintains that it is almost impossible for many of the clerks to live even comfortably, seeing that in many cities statistics show that the average wage is seldom more than \$5 a week.

MAYOR WITHHOLDS APPROVAL

Five of the liquor licenses passed upon by the city council Monday evening have not yet passed muster with Mayor Bransford, and have not received his signature. The opinion of the executive, there is something in the bonds that is not satisfactory, and he will make investigations before attaching his signature. The licenses affected are those of John Lollin, A. B. Margetts, the Sullivan Drug company, N. M. Rosenblum and the Chesapeake L.

Other council proceedings that did not receive the mayor's approval yesterday were paying extension No. 46, and extending No. 14 on the city and gutter extension No. 8. Mr. Bransford would know the city's portion of the expense of these improvements before he would sign the same. The same question was answered concerning the proposed laying of sidewalks on Capitol hill, as petitioned by E. B. Atkins and others, before the measure will be endorsed by the mayor.

MAIL ORDER HOUSE BUSY.

An eastern mail order house, said to be the largest in the world, is carrying on an advertising campaign in Utah and adjacent states, in the last two days it has sent two carloads of catalogues into this city, and four more carloads are in transit. The catalogues mean 70,000 catalogues enough to supply all the farmers in Utah, Idaho, Wyoming and Nevada. Secy. Haddock of the Manufacturers Merchants' association says this means taking an immense amount of money from this country, never to return, and in his opinion it will be a hard blow at home business and industry.
