Ogden, Nov. 1.—There were a number of spectators in the district court room last evening when Judge Howell called the case of Skeen vs Joseph Stanford and the defendant entered a plea of not guilty, and asked that his attorneys, C. R. Hollinsworth be permitted to make a statement for him, which was granted.

Mr. Hollinsworth.—If the court please, Mr. Stanford has prepared in writing and has signed a statement which may be termed one in explanation of his plea of not guilty, and which I know it is an unusual request to make, still I am going to ask the court to exercise its discretion and permit the statement to be filed and made a part of the files and records in this case, and I hope the court will grant my request. At this time I move pursuant to consent of counsel for the assessor, that the proceeding instituted by J. D. Skeen against Joseph Stanford be dismissed.

Provo, Nov. 1.—A head-on collision between two freight trains this side of Thistle yesterday about 11 o'clock caused a bad wreck and stopped trains on the Ho Grande Western road all day yesterday. The extent of the wreck is not known here. Two men were injured, Engineer T. I. Lamplough, who suffered a compound fracture of the left leg below the knee, and another man whose name is not known. The accident happened through a misunderstanding of orders by one of the engineers.
