man came in for a bitter arraignment at the hands of Representative Mondell of Wyoming in an address before the members of the house yesterday. A critic of his policy was certain to be denounced as an enemy of the public welfare, said he. Drawing a comparison, the interior department had administered \$6,000,000 of money at \$2000 a year, but it was proposed to appropriate this year nearly \$3,000,000 for the forest reserve for administering an area not quite double. His administration headquarters established this year cost \$200,000 for clerical help, but the change had reduced expenses in Washington only \$40,000. He designated the branch offices like the Ogden plant as "being put out to pasture" the service by creating local pride, saying \$100 for card indexes to be used in publishing self-laudatory articles. The speaker denounced the forestry bureau for interfering with development, disregarding the rights of the people, in the amount of the reserves and deplored its policy of federal domination of natural resources.

INJURED BY STREET CAR.

Louis Strausberg Falls to Notice Its Approach—May Die as Result.

Louis Strausberg, aged 72, was struck by a north-bound Poplar Grove street car at 9:25 last evening at Sixth South

and West Temple streets. His right leg was so crushed that amputation was necessary at the Groves L. D. S. hospital, where he was taken. Motor-man George Thompson says he had stopped to let a passenger off at the west corner, and in response to the bell to go ahead, sent his car around the curve when Strausberg appeared in front as the head light swung around to the spot. He had evidently taken the car track to avoid walking through the muddy roadway, and being somewhat deaf, failed to notice that the car was so close to him. The car was not going fast, and had traveled not over 30 feet from the corner when it struck Strausberg. The unfortunate man may not survive, owing to his advanced age, and the serious bruises sustained besides the injury to his leg.

Mr. Strausberg lives at Tooele where he owns a ranch. His wife and several children live with him in Tooele. He is a veteran of Johnston's army, coming to Utah with that command, and was for some years a soldier in the Fourteenth U. S. Infantry. When his term of enlistment expired he remained in Utah. Mr. Strausberg has a daughter ill at 9 Willard court, and had come to this city to see her.
