

# OPERATION UPON PRESIDENT

New York Medical Journal Gives  
Full Details.

## GRAIN OF MORPHINE GIVEN

First Bullet Did No Essential Harm—  
Incision into the Abdomen—Put-  
ting Sutures in Wound.

New York, Sept. 13.—The New York Medical Journal in its issue this week will print the following account of the operation upon President McKinley following his shooting at Buffalo last Friday. This report is furnished by a Buffalo physician who was present at the operation. Beginning with the arrival of the President at the hospital, the account says:

The hospital internes removed the President's clothing, ascertained the location of the wounds, and made ready for the surgeons, who had been summoned by telephone. Dr. Edward C. Mann administered one-fourth of a grain of morphine hypodermically,

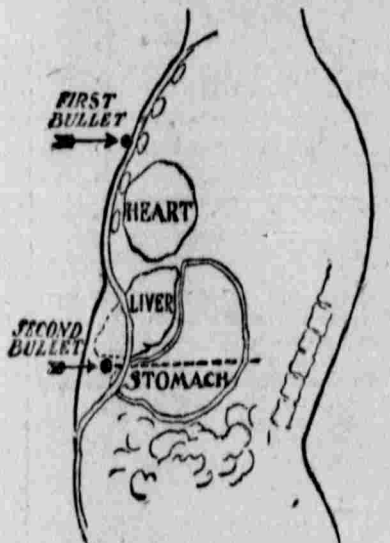


DIAGRAM SHOWING WHERE PRESIDENT

which served a good purpose in alleviating nerve strain. Dr. N. W. Wilson, sanitary officer of the exposition, was at a remote part of the grounds, making an inspection, when he was notified by one of the guards of the injury to the President. Dr. Wilson proceeded to the hospital, and by virtue of his office assumed control pending the arrival of the surgeons. This was at 4:35 p. m. The first to arrive was Dr. Herndon, who brought with him Dr. Wasdin of the marine hospital service. Dr. Mynter saw the serious nature of the wound, informed the President that the operation was necessary, and set about the usual preparations for an abdominal incision.

Dr. Wilson, the internes, and the

nurses, were all actively at work furthering the preparations when Dr. Matthews, Dr. Mann, professor of obstetrics and gynecology in the medical department, University of Buffalo, arrived at the hospital, which was a few minutes after 5 o'clock. After five minutes more Dr. John Farmer, professor of anatomy and clinical surgery in the institution above mentioned, came into the hospital. In ten minutes more Dr. Mann had made himself ready, and by common consent of the surgeons, together with approval of the President and his advisers, proceeded with the operation.

At Dr. Mann's request, Dr. Wasdin assumed charge of the anesthetic, and began the administration of ether at 5:20, one hour, and fifteen minutes after the wound was inflicted. Dr. Wilson was asked to keep the record. Dr. Mynter to stand opposite the operator as first assistant, and Dr. Farmer to stand next to Dr. Mann as consultant and assistant. Dr. E. W. Lees, of St. Louis, a visitor at the exposition, who came to the hospital before the other surgeons arrived, was asked by Dr. Mann to stand next to Dr. Mynter as an additional assistant. Dr. P. M. Hixey, who was summoned from the Milburn home, where he went in company with Mrs. McKinley, arrived just as the operation began. Dr. Roswell Park, had gone to Niagara Falls, and a special train to bring him to Buffalo was ordered by Harry Payne, general agent of the New York Central railroad. It should be mentioned that the first or uppermost shot went through the President's clothing and made an abrasion about the center of the sternum. The bullet was found inside the waistcoat and did no essential harm. The clothing was burned by the explosion of the powder at this point.

The President took the ether kindly, and was well under its influence within the next ten minutes. The abdomen having been aseptically prepared, an incision three inches long was made perpendicular to the body, and including the opening made by the ball—a 32-caliber—that was located four inches below the left nipple, and an inch and a half to the left of the median line. The incision went through a deep layer of fat before the peritoneum was reached, hence the incision was en-

larged another inch. A piece of cloth—probably a bit of undershirt—was found in the track of the missile, which looked as if it had been "punched out" by the bullet. Upon opening the peritoneum a bullet hole was discovered in the interior central portion of the stomach. The viscous was drawn open in the operation wound and the perforation after examination was closed with a double row of silk sutures. A little oozing of the stomach contents had occurred through the opening—all of which was wiped away. A further enlargement of the incision now became necessary in order to examine the dorsal of the stomach, upon which another opening was found. This was sutured in manner like unto the first, and the sluggish hands of the clock marked 6:12. The intestines were examined for possible wounds, but happily none was found and these were wrapped in moist, hot towels. A previous hypodermic injection had been made, and now 25 minims of brandy were similarly administered. A further search for the missile failed to discover it, but it became apparent that it had done no over-vital damage, with the strong probability that it lost itself in the thick lumbar muscles.

Dr. Roswell Park arrived about this time—6:25—and joined the staff as consultant.

The abdominal cavity was flushed with normal salt solution, and the closure began. Seven deep, silk worm gut sutures were employed, and cut gut was placed superficially between them. About 6:50, the anesthetic was discontinued and the abdominal bandage was applied. The operation on which so much of moment depended was finished. The President's pulse was 122, respiration 32.

### CZOLGOSZ'S CASE.

He is Neither Insane Nor Breaking  
Down.

Buffalo, Sept. 13.—The insanity experts who are keeping close watch on Czolgosz say he is not breaking down. Doctors Fowler and Crogo, the police surgeons, saw him again last evening for a short time.

"Is he showing any signs of breaking down?" Dr. Fowler was asked.

"No."

"His condition is unchanged?"

"Yes."

The police deny the report that the prisoner is being closely confined to his cell. They say he is allowed to take a little air, daily, consisting of walking up and down the corridor outside his cell.

"Will the Buffalo police co-operate with the Chicago police in opposing the habeas corpus proceedings instituted by the Goldman woman in Chicago?" Supt. Ball was asked.

"I don't know," he replied. "Dist. Atty. Penny has been indisposed for the past 48 hours, and it is a subject we have not discussed."

### Czolgosz Worked in Wilmington.

Wilmington, Del., Sept. 13.—According to the story told by Frank Niedosyk, a Pole, President McKinley's assistant once worked in Wilmington. Niedosyk said that a young man who gave his name as Leon Czolgosz arrived here on a freight train about six years ago, obtained work as a copper smith at the plant of the Harlan Hollingsworth company, boat builders. He was receiving \$22 a week, but left his job in a few weeks on the pretext that he was not getting money enough. After working a few days at house painting he left the city. Niedosyk is positive as to the identity of the man,

as he boarded in the same house with him and readily recognized him in the pictures of the assassin now being published.

### EMMA GOLDMAN ET AL.

Believed All Will be Given Liberty  
on Bail.

Chicago, Sept. 13.—Emma Goldman and the other nine alleged anarchists under arrest in this city, it is now believed, will all be given a chance to obtain liberty on bail when the habeas corpus proceeding in Judge Chetlain's court comes up today. City Prosecutor Taylor has decided that there is

no reason whatever for continuing to hold Abraham Isak, Jr., the 19-year-old son of the elder Isak, longer in custody. Nothing, however, will be done in young Isak's case until after the hearing today. As no evidence has as yet been received from Buffalo, Taylor says that the present charges are consequently entitled to bail. He will, however, ask to have the bail placed at a high figure, possibly \$15,000 or \$20,000. Against this amount it is

expected there will be strenuous resistance and the attorney for the prisoner will insist that a few hundred dollars bail is enough. Emma Goldman is not a party to the habeas corpus proceedings but Justice Prindle has announced that he will be governed in her case by the decision in the other cases and will fix her bail accordingly if the nine men are admitted to bail.

### Anarchist Maggio Bound Over.

Santa Fe, N. M., Sept. 12.—Maggio, the anarchist, has been taken from Silver City to Albuquerque, where he was cross-examined and sweated but refused to divulge anything upon the subject of the President's assassination, although witnesses were present to prove that he predicted that the President would be assassinated. He was bound over for court on the charge of conspiracy to murder.

### Russo-German Bank Syndicate.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 13.—A syndicate of German and Russian banks has agreed, on government guarantee, to lend eighty million marks to the Moscow, Gdan, Southeastern and Lodz railroads.

### Chinese Minister Learning German.

Berlin, Sept. 12.—Lu Hui Houn, the retiring Chinese minister to Germany, has not yet presented his letter of recall. King Chang, his successor, is mastering the German language.

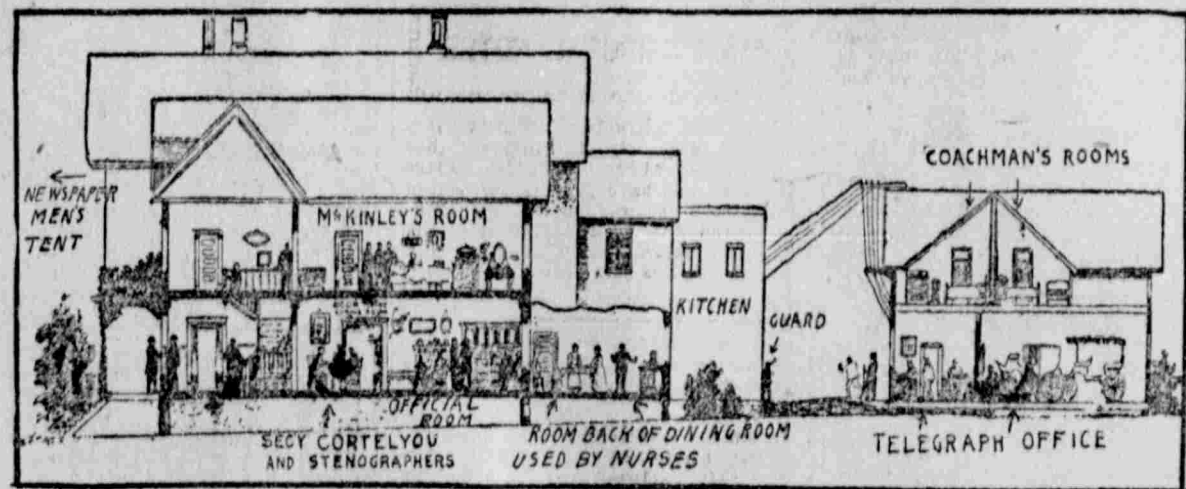


DIAGRAM OF MILBURN HOUSE, WHERE PRESIDENT MCKINLEY LIES.
