MARRIAGES.

MUMFORD-SAXTON.—At Upton, Summit County, November 9th, 1885, by Bishop John Clark, Mr. John W. Mumford, son of Thos. and Elizabeth Mumford, to Miss Maud M. Saxton, daughter of John and Matilda Saxton.

TOBIASON-WOOLLEY.—In Logan Oct. 21, 1885, Theodore Tobiason to Laura V. Woolley, daughter of Bishop John and Caroline Woolley, of the 9th Ward.

EVANS-OAKEY.—In Logan, November 12, 1885, William E. Evans, son of John and Mary Evans, of East Bountiful, Davis County, to Miss Lucy A. Oakey, daughter of Thomas and Ann Oakey, of the 8th ward of this city.

OBITUARY.

HOLBROOK.—At Bountiful, November 14, 1885, of old age and general debility, Joseph Holbrook. Deceased was born January 16, 1806, in the town of Ansville, Oneida County, New York; was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints January 6, 1833, in Warrow, Genesee County, New York, by Leonard Rich, and was ordained an Elder April 12, 1833, by Reynolds Cahoon. He was one of the members of Zion's Camp in the battle of Crooked River, October 25, 1838, and received a wound from one of the mob, being cut across the arm with a sword. He afterwards gathered with the Saints to Nauvoo and was commissioned as captain in the 15th regiment of the militia of the State of Illinois on the 6th of April, 1841, by Governor Carlin. He was also appointed a policeman of the City of Nauvoo on the 15th of January, 1845. He left with the Saints for the west in the spring of 1846, and stopped at Ponca, Winter Quarters, and Mosquito Creek, remaining at the latter place during the winter, and journeying westward in the spring and arriving in the valley of Salt Lake Sept. 20th, 1848. He located Bountiful in the spring of 1850, where he remained until his death. He was appointed Judge of Davis County, Feb. 6th, 1851, which position he held for eight years and was re-appointed

in 1861. He was also elected to the Legislative Council in 1857 and to the House of Representatives in 1859, which terms he filled. He also filled the office of Counselor to Bishop Stoker and afterwards to Anson Call. He built the first school house in Bountiful, and during his life he built some fifty-two houses. He died as he lived, faithful to every trust. He had 18 children, 9 of whom are living; 37 grandchildren, 33 of whom are living; 68 great-grandchildren, 64 of whom are living, and 2 great great-grandchildren.

DEATHS.

COOK.—In Grand Junction, Colorado, Phebe H., beloved daughter of Joseph H. and Nellie A. Cook; born September 19, 1882, died November 14th, 1885. Cause of death, cerebro spinal meningitis, caused from an extensive burn.

HULET.—At Fairview, of old age, Nov. 7, 1885, Sylvester Hulet; born in Massachusetts March 1, 1800; was associated with the Latter-day Saints in Kirtland and Missouri, and also lived in Nauvoo, Ill., and was one of the old settlers of Mantel, Sanpete Co.

WHITEHEAD.—At Fountain Green, Sanpete Co., October 26, 1885, of intermittent fever, after an illness of two weeks, William Whitehead; born April 11, 1837, at Manmore Green, near Wolverhampton, Staffordshire, England; embraced the Gospel in 1884; emigrated to Utah in April last; died a faithful Latter-day Saint.

ROSTGAARD.—In this city, November 14th, 1885, of general debility, Carl Rostgaard; born at Copenhagen, Denmark, November 24th, 1806.

He was a faithful Latter-day Saint, and was greatly respected by his acquaintances.

LUTZ.—In Randolph, Utah, November 6th, 1885, of paralysis and diabetes, Susannah, wife of Albert Lutz, and daughter of Robert and Jane Johnson Dubois.

She was born at Pens Neck, Salem Co., New Jersey, January 22, 1816; baptized February 12, 1840, at Philadelphia; came to Winter Quarters in 1846; and to Salt Lake City in 1852; removed to Cache Valley in 1870, and to Randolph in 1879. Sister Lutz lived the life of a faithful Latter-day Saint, and died in hope of a glorious resurrection. She was the mother of 14 children, and leaves a husband, 5 children, 32 grandchildren, 5 great grandchildren, and a host of friends to mourn her departure.

MOSS.—At E. T. Tooele County, on Friday, November 6th, 1885, in the eighty-fourth year of her age, Abigail Moss; born May 29th, 1802, in Barrington, Stafford County, New Hampshire, where she embraced the Gospel, and soon afterwards removed to Nauvoo. She crossed the plains in 1850, and in connection with her husband, Thomas Moss, was among the first settlers of E. T. Tooele County, where she has resided up to the time of her death. She died a believer in the everlasting Gospel.

BOARDMAN.—In this city, November 20, 1885, of general debility, William Boardman; in his 73rd year; born in Preston, Lancashire, England.

The funeral service will be held in the 16th Ward meeting house to-morrow (Sunday), commencing at 12 m. Friends respectfully invited.

WORTHEN.—In this city, Nov. 21, 1885, of general debility, Mrs. Amanda Worthen; born in Tolon Co., Conn., Aug. 3rd, 1830. She leaves a large family.

Funeral from late residence, 170 F. Street, on Monday, at 2 p. m. Relatives and friends invited to attend.

TEMPLEMAN.—In Big Cottonwood Ward, November 4th, 1885, from injuries received through being thrown from a wagon, Matthew Templeman, born at Wightmore, Cliff Common, Yorkshire, England, November 9th, 1814; migrated to Utah in 1865.
