INAUGURAL CEREMONIES.

Inangural Day has been celebrated as no other in the bistory of Utah. In anticipation of the moment us occasion the citizens of the new State made extensive preparations to celebrate and celebrate they did as never before. The city was thronged with visitor-from outside points and with the thousands of home people made locomotion well nign impossible through the public thoroughlares. The great procession that passed over the course previously published, under the direction of Grand Marshal Burton and aids, started to move very soon after schedule time and presented a magnificent spectacle as it wended its way to the Tabernacle, which it reached at noon, and which bad crowded within its capacious walls more people than blage before.

The decorations of the Tabernacle were most lavish and well chosen. Spread out beneath the great central surface of the dome like cell-ing was "Old Glory," the largest American flag ever made. Its exact eize is 75 by 150 feet. In the upper corner among the other stars was the forty-fifth, representing Utah. By meaus of an ingeniously devised incandescent light the new atar cast its refulgent rays upo the patriotic thousands who sat in the gallery and auditorium below. From this great flag were numberless red, white and bine streamers running in all directions, uniting with an elaborate fringe of bunting and flags which decorated the face of the gallery. All the speakers' stands were most beautifully draped in the national colore, while a great American eagle eurmounted the tower hetween the great pipes of the organ, and immediately below was the mayle word "Dtab"—a magnificent electrical cres-

On the speakers' stands were many prominent citizene, among them the following: Presidents Woodruff, Cannon and Smith, Hon. Jos. L. Rawline, Acting Governor Richards, Governor Wells, Chief Justice Zine, Judges Miner, Bartch, King, Judd, Baskin, Commissioners Tatluck and Sherman, John Henry Smith, Francis M. Lymsn, A. H. Cannon, Brigham Young, R. C. Chambers, J. W. Whitehead, General Peurose of the U.S. A., and numerous other army and National Guard officers. Among the latter were General John Q. Cannon, Brigadier General Young, Colnels Clayton and Jepnings.

Precisely at 12:15 Acting Governer Richards called the vast assemblage to order. He spoke very briefly and the sphetance of his remarks was as fol lows: "I feel very sousitly the great bonor that the committee has conferred upon me in selecting me to fill this important position tonay. For nearly fifty years the people of Utab bave been bave been patiently and prayerfully waiting for this suspicious occasionthis blessed day. Ever since my childbood I have been taught that the time would come when the citiz-ne or Utah would be accorded every political and civil right granted to their fellow citizens throughout the United States. Not less than three generations

of people are living to this new State who have never cast a vate for a President of the United States. But on Nov mber next they will go to the polls and exercise that privilege that all freemen love so well. This is the proudest day of my life, and when I say that I but express the feelings of at least a quarter of a million of people, who all join in saturing the new star and in giving thanks for the abandosment of Territorial bondage for that more peried government to be found under Statebood. (Applause.)
