Among the important measures remaining to be acted upon are the currency, moiety and several appropriation bills, also the 25 CENTS A POUND bill to provide a government for the District of Columbia. All of those measures will evoke considerable discussion, and it is doubted if they can be disposed of as early as Monday nex . A strong effort will be made, however, through night sessions and extra work, to dispose of the business on hand for an adjournment on that day. - Washington Star, June 15.

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
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
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
