Several New Features Have Been Added to the Fair.

Trade Pavilion Every Evening.—Admission will Large.—Some of the Exhibitors.

The closing day of the second week of the Industrial Fair has set an interesting record of attendance. There has been a falling off since Saturday, but not to anything like the extent that was anticipated. People come now and again to view the interesting exhibits. A good time is being developed among the ladies who are not shopping.
