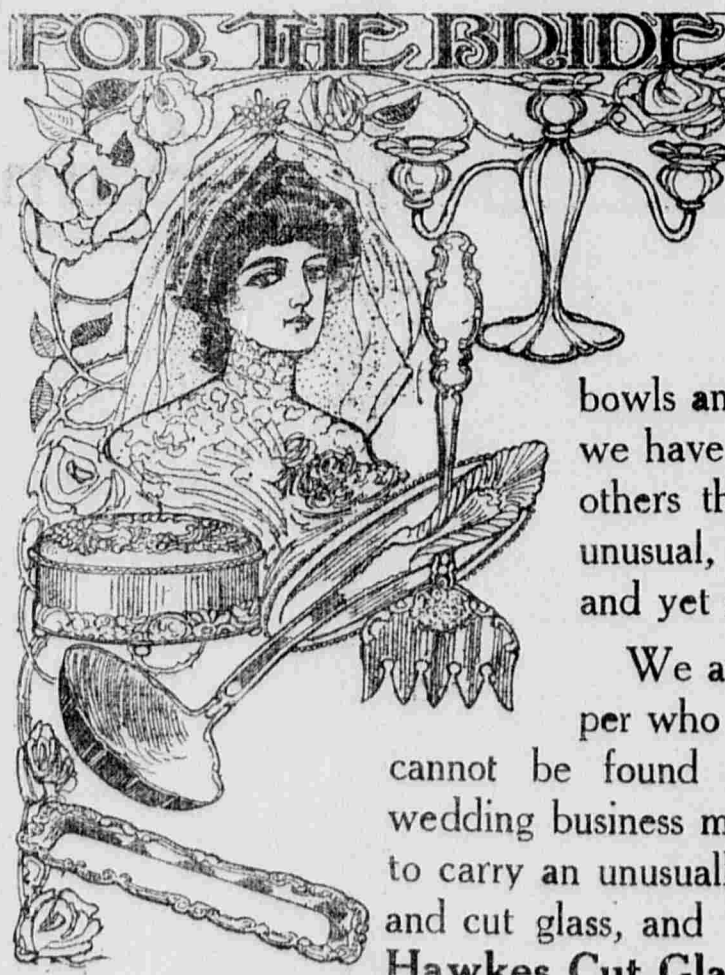
HER BEST EMBROIDERY FROCK.
