## THE END OF THE WAR.

Arguments in the Denver Fire and Police Case.

BOTH SIDES SUBMIT TO THE COURT

The Governor Giving Judgment at General Farney.—A Characteristic Message.

DENVER, Colo., March 19.—The supreme court case was crowded this afternoon with lawyers, politicians and other interested citizens, while arguments were being made on the question submitted by the governor to decide whether Orr and Martin or Morris and Barnes are legally entitled to offices as members of the fire and police force.
