DEATHS.

CLAYTON—In St. George, March 2d, 1886, Matthew Clayton; born October 7th, 1803, at Wintthrop, Nottingham, England; was baptized into the Church February 16th, 1839, in England, and confirmed by Elder Wm. Clayton. He left England in 1840, arriving in Salt Lake City in 1850.

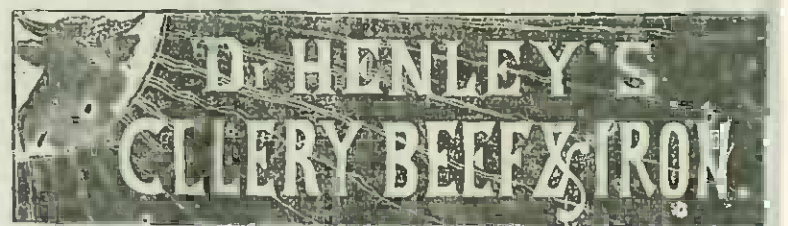
