UTAH CROP PROSPECTS.

With this issue the weekly weather crop bulietin of the Utah weather ser-Vice is resumed for the season of 1895.

The season opens earlier than usual and with conditions favorable to the farmers of Utah. The past wioter was not assevere one, although tempera-tures as low as 33 degrees below zero were reported during the month of Fe ruary from the northeastern section of the Territory. The 1088 of stock from cold and starvation was neminal. During the cold period in January and F. bruary the snow on the ground was sufficient for the protec-tion of the winter wheat. 'Inc snow tion of the winter wheat. 'The anow fall during the winter was slightly above the normal amount.

During the past week the tempera-ture averaged below the norm d. Farm work which had been progressing in all districts was interrupted by a storp Center which passed over the Territory from the 4th to the 6th, accompanied by rain and snow, and followed by a moderately cold wave, which checked the growth of vegetation and did some damage to fruit trees and early gardens in the southern half of the Territory. Considerable plowing and seeding has been done already in all sections, it the weather permits farm operations will be in foll blast during the coming Week.

Box Elder County-Box Elder. The fall grain has wintered well and the prospect is promising. Warm weather in March lored the vegetation which is now being checked by plate frost.

Deweyville. The first part of the week was all that could be desired for farming operations, the days were warm and pleasant and no frost at n gat, but on the 4 h it turned very cold with wind from the north, cold tinuing that way until the 6th. The nights since the 4.5 have been very cold but the weather is moderating now and it is werm and pleasant There has been considerable plowing and seeding done here during the week.

Cache County-Benson, The weather for the past week has been fine tor the farmers who are busy putting to grain. Night frests are having a disastrous effect on tall grain and your g lucern. Very little seeding cone; wenther uniavorable.
